





Vaccine Now at Doctors' Offices

It is announced that Salk antipoliomyelitis vaccine has been released in quantities to the local community physicians for use in their private practices. Due to moderate limitation of supplies of the vaccine, it is to be used at present only in the age group of one year through fourteen years of age, and in cases of pregnancy.

The vaccine is supplied free by purchase with state and federal funds, but the private physician is not restricted from charging a fee for its administration.

The schedule of administration of vaccine recommended is a first injection now, followed by a second injection in 2-4 weeks. A third injection completes the series, and should be obtained 5-9 months after the first inlection.

Since the effectiveness of the vaccine is preventing paralysis In individuals afflicted with acute poliomyelitis is high, and the vaccine has almost no significant ill effect, it is strongly recommended that all parents take eligible children to their doctors for inoculation and protection. 

I think I will be around here


until the first of December and then will go on to San Antionio for the winter.
