They Started Up the Paper Again

ALLYS AND CONSTANCE ROE reactivated the Messenger in 1952. Their project: To get the paper out in three days' time and have four days each week for keeping house, gardening, and writing free-lance for magazines.

Allys died in 1953, and Connie has got out the paper since. Frances Tranbarger, the youngest Roe child, operated the linotype until the changeover to the offset method. Dick Louisell

and Bob Gross, along with George Steib, were after-school-and-Saturday helpers on the ads and makeup, in the old shop.

The present working force is Connie, acting as editor, publisher, sweeper-outer, and pasteup hand, and Mrs. Virginia Baxter typing out the news columns on the IBM. Mrs. Clara Smith comes in Wednesday afternoons and helps fold the edition.

ROLLA E. AND MINNIE I. ROE, who founded the Messenger in 1912. They both worked on the paper every day, setting type by hand. They came to Weidman with six children (the other five were grown and earning their own way) and they raised the six and established their home here. The Messenger was suspended during World War I II, but reactivated in 1952.

Rolla Roe died May 30, 1942, but Mrs. Roe still reads the page proofs, and is hale and hearty at 87.

The Messenger never again will have as competent and well-loved editor as Rolla Roe. The Messenger goes on, but times are

changed. The world of Rolla Roe and his old-time Messenger is gone.

PRODUCTION DROPS IN NO. 2 D. H. I. A. AUGUST REPORT

As is expected, the production of milk drops in July and August both in quantity and test. Walter Smith, supervisor, reports the average cow made 907 lbs. of milk and 31 lbs. of fat for the month of August. Norman Gross, Weidman, joined the association and had his first test this month. Loss of production results from the hot weather and worry fighting flies. Also the test normally is

lowest in July and August.
Russell Cowden had the highest production for his herd of 22 cows that produced 48.2 lbs. of fat for the month. Next comes Kendall Wood with 13 cows averaging 38.5 lbs. of fat; William Phillips with 12 cows at 37.2 lbs. of fat; Ernest Bradley with 11 cows, producing 36.0 lbs.; and Dale Davis and Son with 16 cows at 34.8 lbs. of fat. Other herds over 30 lbs. of fat average were: William Block and Sons, Stanley Erwin and Son, and Herbert Yunker.

There were less high cows than previous months, as can be realized from the season of the year. Norman Gross owned a cow making 72 lbs. of fat; Russell Cowden owned one at 66 lbs. of fat; Fred McDonald with one at 65 lbs. of fat and Art Schrock, one at 64 lbs. of fat, and Dale Davis and Son, one at 62 lbs. of fat. Many others were noted that produced over 50 lbs. of fat. An increase

in production was anticipated in September. ___0___

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



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
