From Fort Myers, Florida, comes a clipping from the Saginaw Daily News. The Saginaw News said,

in part:
The village of Weidman, with a population of less than 400, has a weekly newspaper, the Weidman Messenger, which has a circulation of more than 1,000 and also

makes some news of its own.

Miss Constance Roe, editor, has changed from the time-honored method of type setting to offset printing to get out her paper.

printing to get out her paper.

Miss Roe changed the style of her newspaper, too. Instead of the standard newspaper page, her paper is printed on a page of magagine size. She said her readers, especially the elderly ones, like the new style, because it is easief to handle.

The paper was established in 1912 by Mr. and Mrs. Rolla Roe, who handset all of the type for their first papers. Mr. Roe died in 1942, but his wife, now 87, continues in the business as a partner with her daughter, Constance. Mrs. Roe still is expert at catching last minute errors in proofs.

The paper was suspended during World War II, and resumed publication in 1952.

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Incidentally, have you noticed how nice the advertisements are, on the new process of printing? Many have, and many have told us and our advertisers about it.

Weidman Ringed By Oil Test Wells

Leonard Makes Location on Old School Site Just East of Town

Weidman is now surrounded by oil tests, with wells going down west, east, farther east, and to the northeast.

Latest start was Leonard Oil Company's Grewett and Cliff Estate No. 1, located se-nw-nw sec. 19, Nottawa, where rotary rig was moved in last Thursday and the test reported at 970 feet Tuesday of this week. The rotary will take it to about 1700 feet, after which cable tools will take it the rest of the way down.

Expectations of Leonard Tuesday were that the well would be completed by Christmas, barring unforeseen accidents. It will be a Dundee test, with expectations of around 3750 feet.

Drillers expected to encounter the Michigan Stray in this well Wednesday or Thursday of this week, where gas possibilities have shown up in some wells.

The well is on an 80-acre lease with oil rights owned jointly by Marion Grewett and the Cliff Estate. John Neyer's Associated Drillers and Producers are drilling the well. It is situated just back of where the old Weidman school used to stand, on the banks of the Coldwater River.

Shorty Merrill's Wieber No. 1, ne-sw sec. 11, Nottawa, on land owned by Margaret Wieber, was reported at 3193 feet Tuesday with formations considered running high. Traverse was expected at around 3200 feet. The well was drilling ahead this week.

On Brazos' Oil Company's State No. 1, located on the Ted Nutt farm in Horr, two miles west, one south, one west and one-quarter mile north of Weidman, trouble was reportedly encountered last week on changing over to cable tools when the derrick was threatened by caveins in the mucky land thereabout. Cement

ing was completed Saturday night and the well was reported at about 1771 feet Monday.

Brazos earlier had stated they expected to complete the well before the first of the year.

To the northeast of Weidman, John Neyer's Associated Drillers and Producers are developing an oil field on the Powell property, with two new offsets scheduled.

It is quite an accomplishment to have herds made over 50 lbs. of fat per cow per month. Two members of the No. 1 DHIA have hit the 60-lb. mark. Fourteen herds were included in this last month's average. The average cow produced 1085 lbs. of milk and 40. 3 lbs. of butterfat.

Robert Recker had the highest herd, with 21 cows that averaged 1817 lbs. of milk and 66 lbs. of fat. This is an all-time high, and great credit should go for this outstanding production record. Not to be outdone, Martin Toth came in with 14 cows that averaged 1721 lbs. of milk and 60 lbs. of fat. Next high is Elmer Recker with 21 cows producing 1481 lbs. of milk and 54 lbs. of fat.

Joe Stevens and son also had a high record, with 28 cows aver-aging 1263 lbs. of milk and 43 lbs. of fat. SCHOOLS-YOUR INVESTMENT IN AMERICA

By Rex Wood, Superintendent, Weidman School.

"Religion, morality and knowledge being necessary to good government and the happiness of mankind, schools and the means of education shall forever be en-

couraged."

First incorporated as part of the Northwest Ordinance of 1787. This is now a part of the Constitution of the State of Michigan. Our forefathers recognized that our nation could remain strong and free only as long as we had an educated citizenry. This philosophy has made America, in the short span of 166 years, the greatest place in the world to live. The vast majority of Americans enjoy a standard of living comparable to that of royalty in many countries. The United States has only 6.3% of the world's population, yet our 50 million telephones represent six out of ten in the entire world. We have two thirds of the world's motor vehicles (56 million), one half of the radio sets (127 mil-lion), most of the TV sets (33 million), and the world's high-est per capita income.

Other facts that make America a better place to live:

The death rate per 1000 has been reduced from 17.2 in 1900 to 9.2 in 1954.

Life expectancy is now 68.6 years. (It is as low as the thirties in some countries.)

Illiteracy, or the inability to read or write, has almost vanished from the population 14 year

of age or over. In 1954, 1999 daily newspapers had a circulation of over 54 million.

There are almost 300, 000 churches in the United States, representing 250 religious bodies, with a membership of nearly 100 million. Total U. S. population, 165 million.

About 30 million children attend public school daily, meeting over one million teachers in

that many classrooms. The number of students is increasing about one million a year and will continue to increase at this rate for a number of years.

We marvel each day at the scientific progress being made in the universities and in industry. New products come on the market almost daily. More and better trained people are available to provide services that raise our

standard of living.

The little red school is being replaced across the country with spacious buildings that provide an environment conducive to learning by doing. Fundamentals are still being taught, but the schools are also concerned with the individual; how he is developing physically, socially and emo-tionally. They are also concerntionally. ed that he have an opportunity to explore vocational fields, that he have training to help him become a responsible citizen in his community, and to help him to become a worthy home member.

The miracle of America has resulted from a number of factors. Perhaps the most important are the abundant natural resources, a political and economic atomosphere conducive to a pioneering spirit, and a system of universal education which supplies the fundamental knowledge so necessary for a highly technical eco-nomy. The moral and physical strength of our country has deep roots in our schools.

Let us take stock, therefore, of our schools-our investment in America.
