## No. 1 DHIA Lists Records

Congratulations are again in order for Robert Recker whose herd has again led the No. 1 DHIA for 1955. This information was made available at the annual meeting held Tuesday night of last week at the Presbyterian Church at Rosebush.

Some 35 members and their wives enjoyed the banquet at 7:30 served by the ladies of the church. Larry Johnson, Dairy Specialist of Michigan State University was present and spoke in detail on the new IBM program used this past year. He answered many questions concerning the procedure and indicated that dairymen throughout Michigan are rapidly being sold on this new program.

Closely following Recker's herd comes the herd of Maurice John and Son whose 28 cows produced 13, 318 lbs. of milk and 477 lbs. of fat per cow per year. Brown Brothers herd of 31 cows made 12, 248 lbs. of milk and 435 lbs. of fat. Joe Stevens and Son with 28 cows averaged 12, 607 lbs. of milk and 434 lbs. of fat. Others above 400 lbs. of butter fat and in production order are: Bader and Ley at 416 lbs. of butter fat, Howard Penrose at 415 lbs. of fat, Martin Toth and Cotter and Myers at 414 lbs. of fat and Fred Hauck with 401 lbs. of fat.

The new board of directors elected for the year consist of Fred Hauck chairman, Robert Recker vice chairman, Milton Brown secretary-treasurer, Ed Ley and Richard Stevens.

## Brazos Oil Co. Readies For Test on Ted Nutt Farm In Sherman

Brazos Oil Company, a subsidiary of the Dow Chemical Company, moved a rig on the Ted Nutt farm in Sherman Township this week, getting ready to test for oil in the Reed City zone, a low section of the Dundee oil-bearing stratum. The Reed City zone usually is located at around 3,800 feet.

The test is being made on the Nutt farm for the first try, with the state holding mineral rights, it was stated this week.

Brazos expect to complete the well by the first of the year or before.

Surrounding the village of Weidman, Leonard Oil Company has been cleaning up odds and ends, they said this week, on land title work before planning to make a location in this area.

For the first time, village lots have been leased, and it is the hope of Weidmanites that the Leonard Company will be able to complete its work here and get going on an oil test for the village of Weidman, something we never have had. The nearest to a test for the town was the Drallette well, located nearly a mile west on the Air Line road. Formations were extremely high on the Drallette well, but the Dundee was closed, and the well abandoned as a dry hole.
