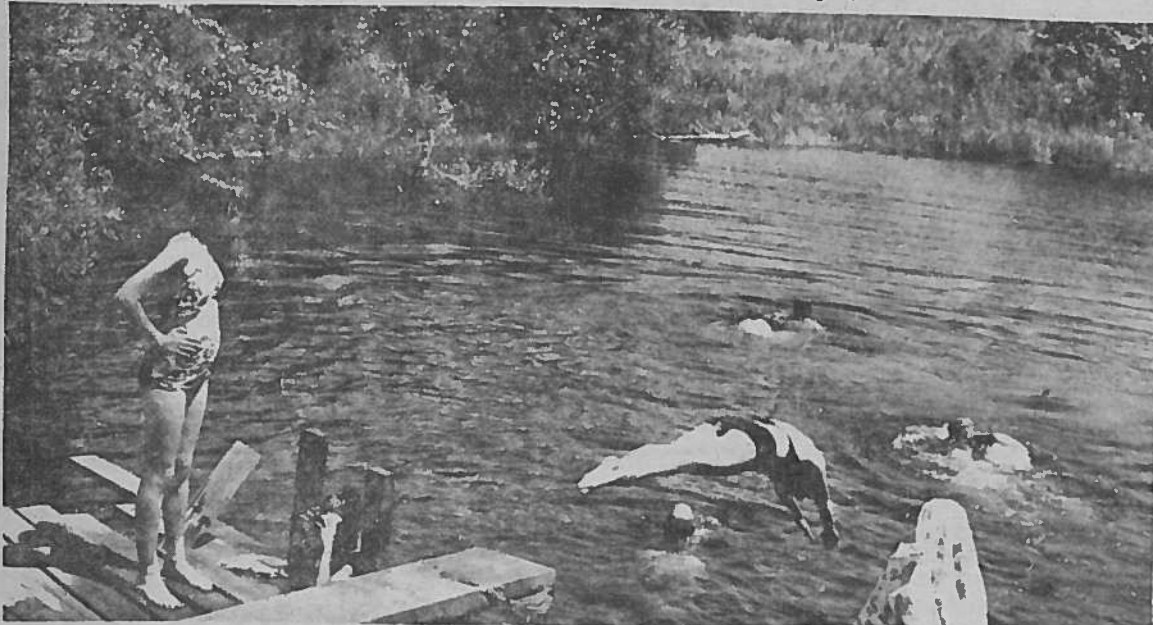

Big Vote Puts Board Members Back in Office

A record vote returned Clyde Beutler and Mitchell McArthur to the school board for another term in Monday's annual unit election. Out of 113 ballots cast, Mitch received 86, Clyde 72, and Kenneth Saunders 17 on write-in votes. Three ballots were spoiled, it was stated Tuesday.

A large attendance at the annual school meeting voted to keep the district on its present 5 mills extra tax for debt retirement, and raised the millage from 6 to 8 based on 80 percent of state equalized valuation for operating expenses for the coming year. The budget as compiled was set at something over a hundred thousand dollars.

A large crowd attended the dance at Elwood Miller's new barn Saturday evening. Mr and Mrs Warren Leiter and Mr and Mrs Fey Forbes supplied music, and Elwood also joined in with his banjo.

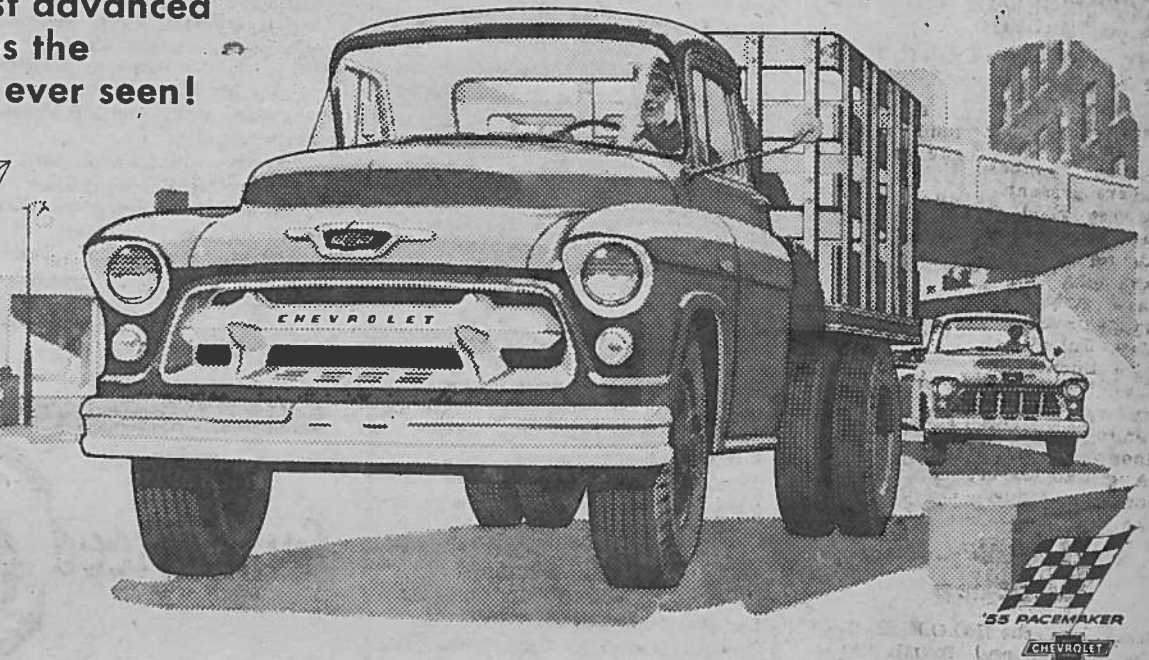

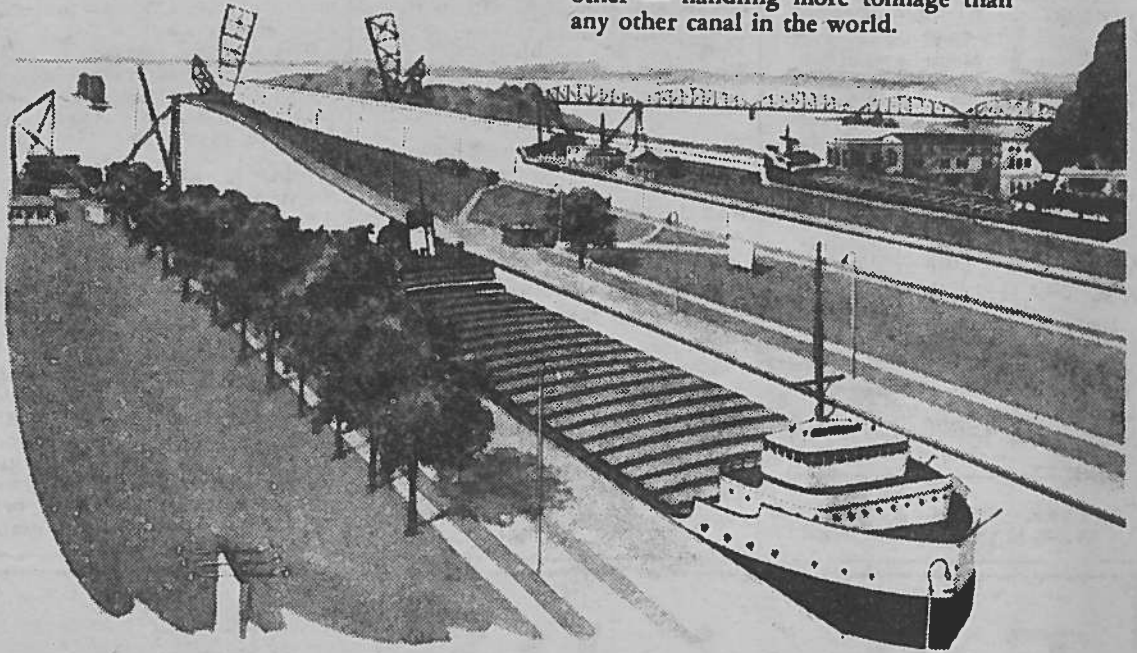
