Fire Hydrants for Weidman Village?

At the regular meeting of the Weidman Business Association Tuesday evening, it was brought out that the need for fire hydrants in the village of Weidman had been recognized at the time of the Bishop fire in the midst of the downtown section.

Cost of water pipe and its installation probably would run over \$2,000, which would have to be paid by popular subscription, as Weidman is an unincorporated village and the townships of Sher-

man and Nottawa could not be expected to be interested monetarily. This would not have to be paid at once; it could be financed over a period of time. The public in the village of Weidman is asked to express its sentiments on this subject. It is felt that three hydrants on the business street would service residences throughout the town. The school would not be included in the coverage, being too far from

the downtown streets. Any business man will listen respectfully to your opinion.

Special Meeting To Determine Weidman Day

A special meeting of the Weidman Business Association is called for tomorrow night, Friday, at 8 o'clock at the Fire Hall, to determine what, if anything, to do about plans for Weidman Day.

So far the Association has been unable to get a carnival signed up, and the question is whether to have any celebration or not, and what to do about it.

to get an inkling of the public's desires in the matter of Weidman Day plans.

At least five of the 1956 graduating class of the Weidman High School are planning to attend college in the fall.

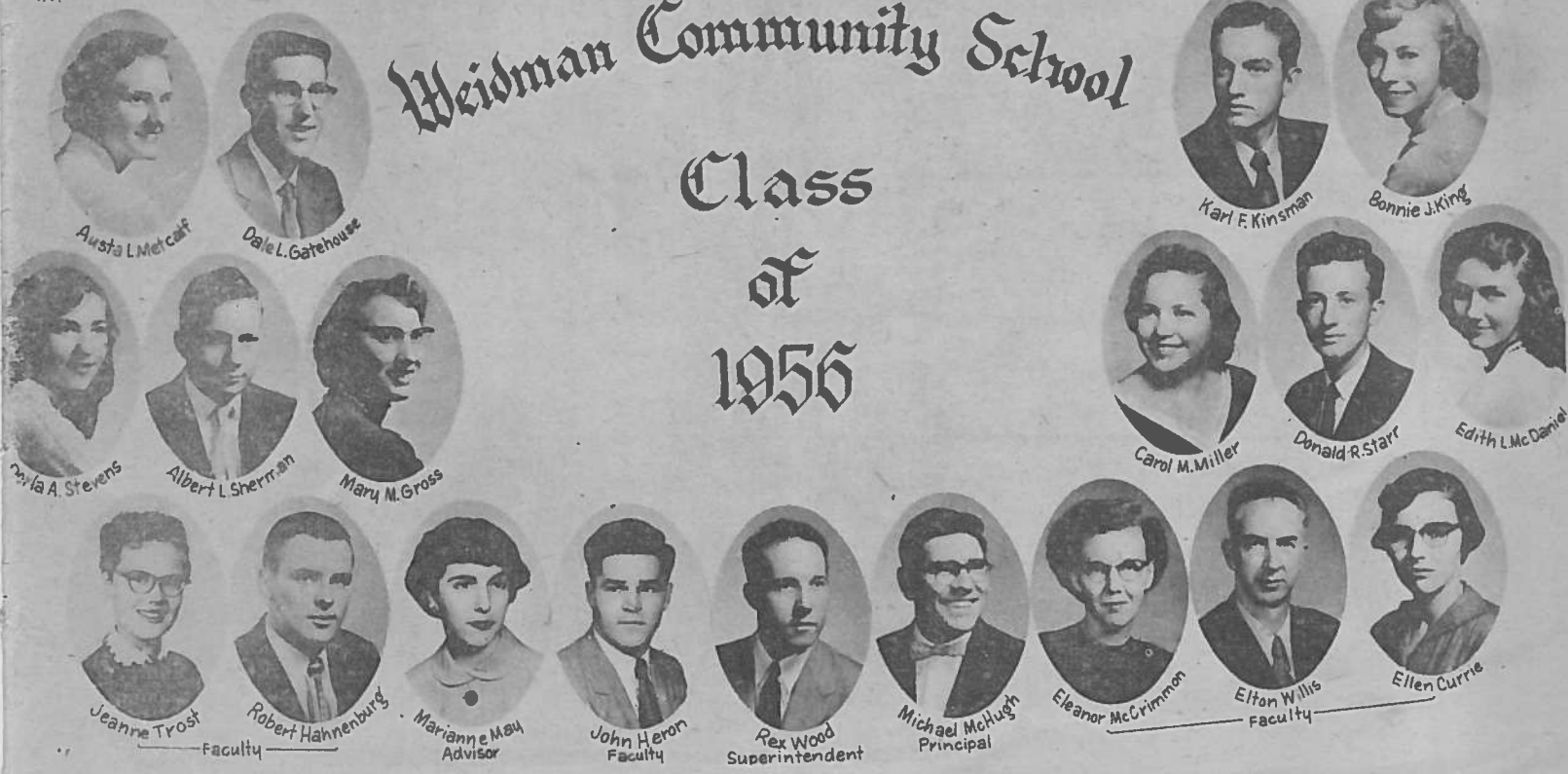
James Carr, son of Mr. and Mrs. Guy Carr, will go to Michigan State University, where his brother, Arwin, is a student.

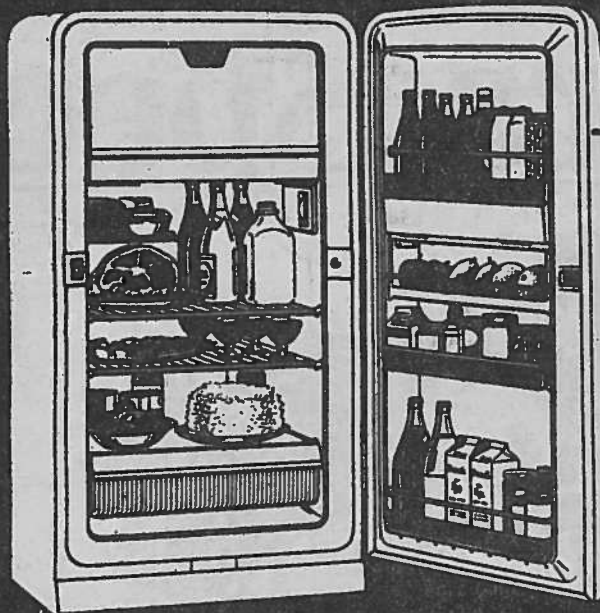

MITCHELL PARK WAS USED ON MEMORIAL DAY

Word comes to us that Mitchell Memorial Park was enjoyed by a good number of picnicking family parties Memorial Day, and also on Sunday. The Weidman Business Association, by whose efforts the park was created and is maintained, is very gratified at the public's appreciation of outing facilities at our town.

Fish have been biting like mad in the Weidman mill pond, and Memorial Day saw more cars and fishermen than ever before appeared, hauling 'em in from the pond waters.

Big bluegills have been rising to everything from worms to fancy fly-bait; rock bass in good size have been taken, and good catches of pike.

Smitty's Service Station put up a "Fishing Information" sign primarily for Memorial Day visitors, and Smitty reports that a lot of folks have stopped to inquire where fishing is best, where the trout streams are, where to get bait and boats, and so on.

All in all, we feel that a step forward was taken this year without much effort, simply in having picnic tables ready at the park for Memorial Day, and good water available; and a welcome for visiting vacationers and fishermen. Memorial services were held at

the Weidman Cemetery Memorial Day, with flowers dropped in the river and a wreath placed for our sailor and soldier dead at the cemetery.

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\$50 FINE FOR DRIVING OVER FIRE HOSE

Last week during the Bishop fire the fire trucks had hose strung out from the middle of the business street to the mill pond in two directions, one line to the east edge of the pond, at the mill, and one to the north side of town.

The hose was laid carefully to one side of the road, and cars were expected to respect the situation and avoid driving over the precious water lines.

It was reported that several cars drove over fire hose that morning, the drivers heedless or ignorant of the vital need for safety of the hose.

The Messenger editor interviewed Ed Fox, Weidman's Fire Chief, this week, and Ed said that it was true some had driven over the hose lines. He pointed out that there was no place in Weidman where a car could not have got to its destination by driving a block or two to detour the fire lines. He also said a penalty of \$50 in fines may be applied to offenders in such a situation.

We feel the Messenger's role in this situation is to point out to the public that no car may drive over a fire hose; that even if driving several miles out of

the way is necessary, a car just can't drive over a fire hose. And for those who would disregard the warning (we can't imagine that there'd be any who would), there is a rather stiff fine.

The firemen did a grand job that day, and the public surely is appreciative of their efforts. All the four departments present in Weidman that morning were volunteer squads (yes, we've learned that even Mt. Pleasant's department is mainly volunteer), and they receive no pay for their dangerous job.

And that brings us to false alarms, and the grave injustice they do our firemen. Every time that old siren lets go, business men and job-holders in Weidman go a-running; and last week we had several false alarms again. After the Bishop fire, you may be sure the firemen scrambled for the fire house when the false alarms let go.

Doesn't seem fair to the volunteers. Answering real alarms is enough, to our thinking. They shouldn't be further burdened by careless dialing or guesswork in choosing telephone numbers.

And finally, we'll say we still think it unfortunate that the Weidman fire number is so set up that wrong-number calls are very easy to put in and set off the alarm. Any number-combination with two sixes in it will set off the siren. So--we the public will just have to be extra careful in dialing

sixes, we guess, as it seems to be impossible to get the fire number changed.

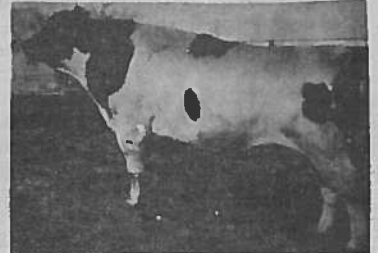
