# Shall We Develop The Millpond Here?

sporadic attempts, usually by individuals, have been made to develop the great potentials of the Weidman millpond as the town's attraction. The matter was brought up at the January meeting of the Weidman Business Association, and the membership agreed that that organization would be interested in taking the project on as a major undertaking dur-ing the next several years. Fishing on the Weidman pond

has long enjoyed far-reaching popularity, sportsmen coming here from many states as well as from nearby towns and our own surrounding area. There are several details of the pond, however, which need develop-ment and attention, such as weed control, water level, a

public fishing site, and so on. The Weidman Business Association could not handle the monetary outlay alone, of course, for this would involve more than they have in their civic kitty during ten years. But there have been offers from individual fishermen, of sums ranging from five to twenty-five dollars, to be put in a fund for development of the millpond for even better

fishing than we have now. The Messenger recently received a letter from a fishing fan, which we here present:

Dear Connie, and Business Mer of Weidman, Michigan:

I am sending you a clipping on a project which Weidman and community can well afford to work on. It is the develop-ment of your local attraction, the project of taking what you have there and making something of it.

As I remember, it took about 25 years to promote the Winchester Dam and get it built. Today no one would want it

It took around 10 years to build the Air Line Road west of Weidman. Who would want that road out, today? It should not take over five

years to put over a project to develop the Weidman millpond to provide better facili-ties for fishermen. I am not interested financial-ly, but think of the hundreds

of people who fish the Weid-man millpond.

We'd have to have the County the land-owners, the Road Commission, and the fishing public back of it. This would be the first step

for something wonderful for this community now, and for future generations.

Personally, I will donate \$25 to start. Get 100 persons to do that, and then put on a drive to get everyone who fishes there to donate whatever they can, from one dollar up. The money would be put in escrow in the

Weidman State Bank until such time as a duly appointed com-mittee would be chosen and a competent organization formed to spend the money to best advantage.

start something! (Signed) Fishing Enthusiast.

We are reminded that Hesperia, a community-minded village of 1,000, has been giving a face-lifting to its millpond in order to make it a tourist attraction and recreation area for local residents.

It wasn't any one person's idea; it was everybody's idea. Many organizations lent their support to the project, expect-ed to be completed some time this year. The job there included clearing out brush, spreading silt, providing a good swimming area, landscaping, a playground area, and stocking their pond with fish from the Conservation Department.

The committee planned water shows and other entertainment for the swimming area. The high school Ag Class took over the landscaping as its project. Owners of tractors, dump trucks jeeps, and bulldozers loaned their equipment for use, and local business men and organiza-tions donated time and labor to help make it a great local at-

traction.

Editorially, the Messenger points out that any town's selfbetterment project is some kind of an Operation Bootstrap, with local people pitching in to help themselves make their home place better. Weidman is blessed with one of the most energetic, united and sincere chambers of commerce (the Weidman Business Association) we have ever seen anywhere. There is every reason to hope that, within the next five years or so, Weidman can make of its mill pond the great big attraction it has in itself to become.

At the Business Association's meeting, Walter Smith, vice-president of the Barryton Rod and Gun Club, offered to presen the local problem to that organ-ization and see what, if anything, it could offer in the way of advice and so on. The Bar-ryton Rod and Gun Club has many members from the Weidman, Beal City and Remus areas.
