FISH THE POND, SAYS CONSERVATION DEPT.

This fall Miles Drallette sent an eight-inch fish in to the Institute for Fisheries Research and received the following letter in reply:

Dear Mr. Drallette:

The fish you sent us is a bluegill. It was four years of age and eight inches in length. This is an excellent rate of growth. The average bluegill in Michigan reaches a length of only 6.6 inches in four years.

Weidman Mill Pond must be a very productive body of water to grow such large bluegills. A lake can be compared to a cow pasture. A pasture with lots of timothy and clover will grow cows bigger and faster than a pasture of sand and crab grass. But, if too many cows are put in a good pasture, none of them will grow very large. This is the common problem in a great many lakes in Michigan--there are too many bluegills for the amount of food available, with the result of tremendous numbers of small fish.

Fortunately, the Weidman Mill Pond is not in this category, and the large number of fish caught each year undoubtedly helps to keep the fish and food supply in balance. Bluegills are very prolific; rarely is there a problem of not enough fish in a lake. It is usually the food that is scarce.

Keep on fishing, and encourage others to fish for these big bluegills.

On the other hand, maybe this is just a sometime thing with the bluegills, maybe they will go back to wantin' flies, before the really cold weather sets in.

If so, you'll see us down there tryin' for some of those beauties other people pull in.

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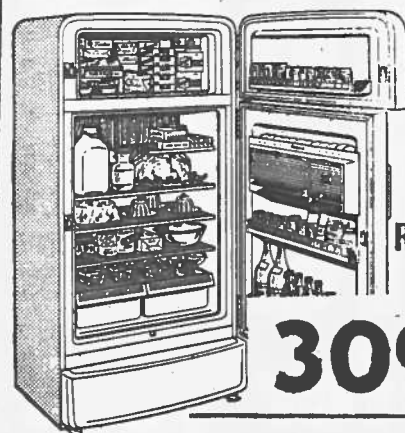
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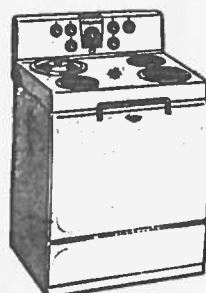
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In the Editor's Mail
