Mitchell Geasler of Brinton Busy Bees 4-H Club has won the state 4-H Club's entomology award and expects to leave Nov. 29 for Chicago to attend the National 4-H Club Congress.

There he will be eligible for a \$400 scholarship, which is awarded to only four 4-H members each year. Mitch expects to attend Michigan State University next year, as he is a Senior this year, in the Barryton High School.

In Chicago, he will stay at the Conrad-Hilton Hotel, with other 4-H members.

He has been in 4-H work for nine years, and his entomology efforts have attracted wide attention in the 4-H world. He has demonstrated his collections of butterflies, moths and other insects at several major meetings. His collections have also been exhibited at the County Fair.

In his entomology collections are eight different species, or orders, of insects; he took third place in the state 4-H Club show in August with his collections, and has demonstrated before 4-H clubs, besides his showings at fairs.

Mitchell's projects this year include a beef project, with three Hereford steers which he will raise and sell at the annual 4-H Fair next year; entomology; Junior Leadership, which involves taking over part of his local club and leading its members; and bird study, and handicraft.
