"One of my great privileges," he said, "is working with the Cub Scouts here, as assistant Cubmaster."

He plans to go on to college at Mt. Pleasant and thereafter teach school.

Michigan Rehab is becoming a known service here to many of us in Weidman, through its helping several of our citizens.

The Weidman Business Association was directed to Michigan Rehab through the Davis Clinic, when the Business Association wanted to sponsor Louise Woodbury for plastic surgery. That's when we got acquainted with Jim Morton of Barryton, Rehab's field man for a five-county area.

Lois Lawson, daughter of Minnie I. Roc, was made a self-sufficient citizen through Michigan Rehab.

Rev. Arlo Vandlen, pastor of the Weidman Methodist Church, received a good part of his education through Michigan Rehab.

There are others in our area who have benefited through this service. Not generally known is the fact that Rehab is available to any disabled person, whether he can pay his way or not. If he can pay, he does. If he can't, Rehab takes up the tab.

"Our business is taking unemployable persons and making them employable," Mr. Morton said in an interview last week. "I should be glad to bring a couple of Rehab films over here to show what has been done."

Not all unemployable persons can be made employable, of course. Rehab determines this possibility, and then goes ahead or not.

Every family has a potential candidate for Rehab--through accident or illness. Every family would do well to see these films, shown free of charge, to understand the kind of help available to disabled persons. Anyone who drives a car is a potential candidate. There are many diseases over which Rehab attains victory for the patient, through training. There are polio cases, amputees, hemiplegics and paraplegics, heart cases, hard-of-hearing and epilepsy.

The films are sponsored by the Weidman Business Association, which urgently invites the public to see them.
