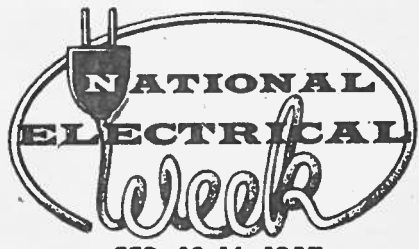


THOMAS A. EDISON OPENED UP A NEW WORLD
