"Although the secret for a happy marriage cannot be givon in a few words, "he stated, "first of all the eligible young man should be a Christian, not merely a church member; a boy who has been reared in a Christian home; a boy who has manifested a genuine interest

in the church all his life,... "Second, he should demonstrate ambition by having com pleted high school and in most instances college or some tech nical training for a trade. And above everything else, for the third qualification, he should not be lazv.

Next Sunday night the sermon will be, "Who Should Carry the Pocketbook?" Fach sermon in this series on courtship, love and marriage deals with an important phase of married life. During these ten weeks the minister is trying to show the secret of the successful marriage and happy home.
