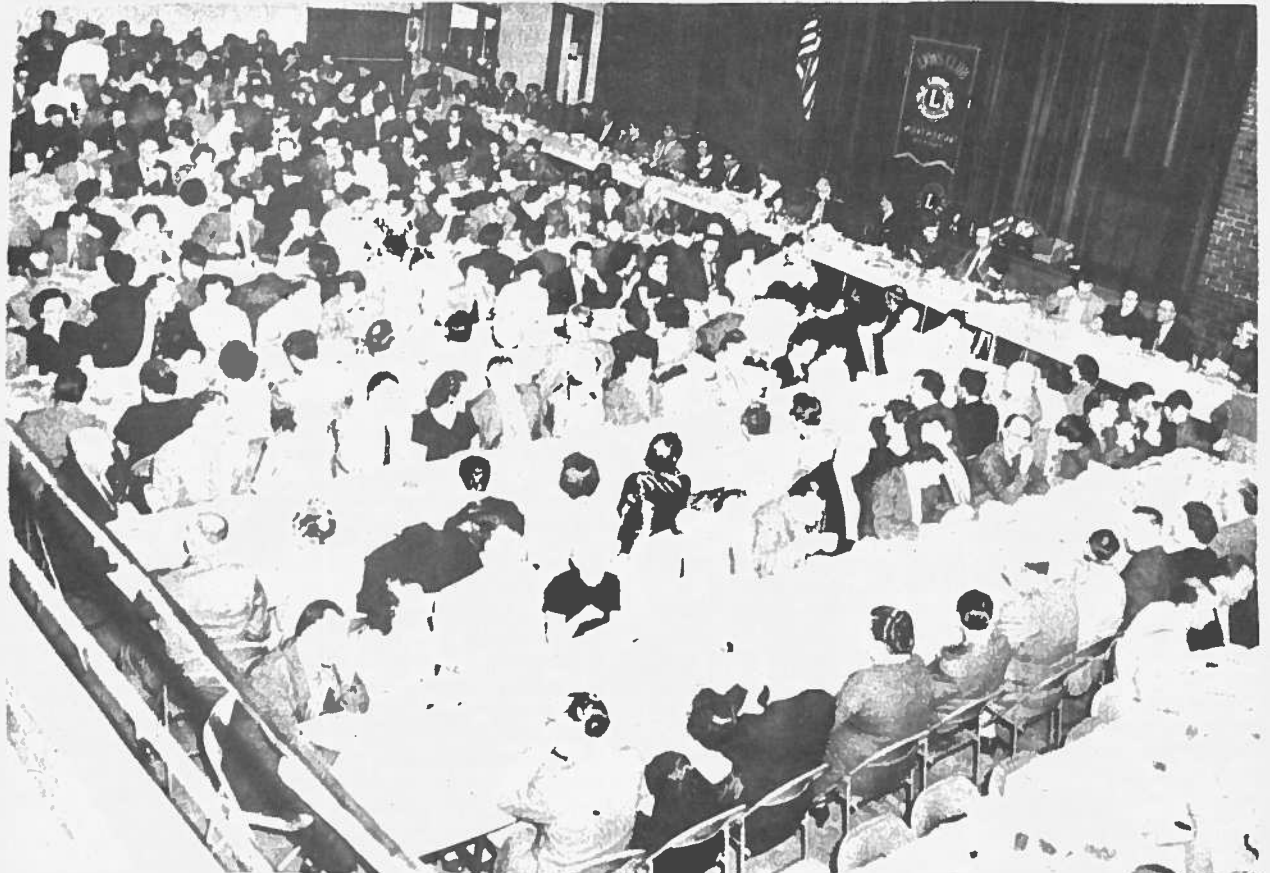

Over 300 Attend Weidman Lions Club Charter Night Banquet

WBA Meets With Conservation Men

At its regular meeting Tuesday evening, the Weidman Business Association discussed several area fishing lakes and ponds with two men from the State Conservation Department.

Walter J. Smith, vice-president of the Barryton Rod and Gun Club, had a list of pertinent questions to ask Marvin Norton, district supervisor for this area, and Hans Peterson, district fishery supervisor.

High on the list was the question of weed control on the Weidman mill pond. Mr. Peterson said that the Conservation Department is experimenting with a poison spray, but it is very expensive and impractical for use, at present, on the Weidman pond. He advised using mechanical means, boats dragging chains, wire, etc., to get weeds off the top surface. He said that in a year or two he believes that the spray process may be perfected to the extent of its desirability on such places as the Weidman pond.

He advised the Business Association to go ahead with development of the Weidman pond as a public recreation place, with the Conservation Department

taking no part in it. He pointed out that the Department consistently is refusing participation in projects relying on dams of any sort, and cited three Consumers Power dams abandoned and offered to the Department as public recreation sites. The Department, Mr. Peterson said, had to turn them down.

Walt asked about building a spawning ledge for walleyed pike on Coldwater Lake, and received assurance that the Department would offer advice and help on planning, with volunteer labor. Walt asked if walleyes have been planted in Coldwater Lake, as a few have been taken there.

"Not yet," Mr. Peterson said. "Coldwater Lake is scheduled for planting with fingerlings, 6,000, I believe, but we have planted none there yet."

Interested was shown in the Six Lakes area, on a proposition to build a dam and flood to connect them all. However, for the Conservation Department to take a hand in it, he said that there must be some state-owned land at the site.
