# TWENTY-SIX FIREMEN PROTECT YOUR HOME

The Nottawa-Sherman Volun-teer Fire Department is manned by 26 men in Weidman. They are business men, and men who live here and hold jobs.

They are on call twenty-four hours a day, and when that old si-reen lets go they drop every-

thing and run for the fire barn. If it's not a false alarm-and there are too many of those--the fire-barn door is up and the truck manned before the guy on the telephone, answer-ing the call, is through talking. In a matter of seconds the fire truck, and usually the aux-iliary tank truck, is roaring down the road, with firemen swinging up on it as it goes or following along in their own cars.

If there's any chance to save a building, these volunteer firemen do it. They are well trained, and they have special equipment. They risk their necks many times fighting fires

in this area. They receive no pay whatso-ever. There is a small fund available to pay for repair to clothes damaged in fire-fightclothes damaged in fife-fight-ing--the firemen go just as they are, in overalls, hundred-dollar suits, or dry-cleaner shirts and pants. Yet they pay their own repair bills for their clothing if it's damaged at a fire.

The Nottawa-Sherman Fire Department makes runs in the village of Weidman, and of course Beal City; and anywhere in Nottawa, Sherman, Gilmore, Coldwater and Broomfield Townships. Wherever a call comes from, there they go. They bail out of bed at three

.m. and maybe fight a fire till eight in the morning, with-out breakfast. They go on Sundays and holidays--there is no off day for a volunteer firefighting group.

We wish we could find just the right words to convey the importance of your help in making the annual Firemen's Ball a success. A good crowd at the dance means, to those twenty-six men who guard your home from fire, that you appreciate their faithfulness and their unstinting labors and daring when the chips are down

Maybe you don't dance. May be you don't even believe in dancing. Would it hurt to buy a couple of tickets and sit out twenty minutes' worth, to show the firemen your understanding and appreciation?

A couple of years ago the idea of having a Queen of the Firemen's Ball was inaugurated, and the dance had to be guar-anteed fit for teenagers' attendance, and since then the student-ticket sales have nearly equaled the adult-tickets. ## NEW ROAD BUILDING WILL END HALF MILE NORTH OF WEIDMAN

Work has been going on all winter on preparing the road north out of Weidman for grad. ing and eventually blacktopping.

County Road Engineer Ernest Bruce said this week that plans call for completing the grading work this year and blacktoppin a year thereafter.

There are no plans, however, for the half-mile leading into town. Work was begun at the north end of the four-mile stretch authorized by and contributed to by four townships: Coldwater, Gilmore, Nottawa and Sherman. The four-mile stretch will leave the improv-ed road high and dry half a

mile north of town. There are no plans for building the road across the millpond, nor of rebuilding or replacing the dangerously crumbling bridge there, Bruce

said. "We have a program for it, but no money," he told the Messenger reporter. Cost for this half mile he estimated at e11 000 \$11,000.
