# Millpond Road To Be Rebuilt Soon

the Weidman millpond on the north road will be rebuilt and prepared for blacktopping along with the other four miles north. it was learned from the Road Commission this week.

This is good news for Weidman, as recent plans were for rebuilding and preparing only the four-mile stretch, leaving the half-mile into Weidman as it is.

County Road Engineer Ernest Bruce said this week that gravel will be laid on the fourmile strip first, then work will be begun on the half-mile stretch which includes the millpond road.

Across the millpond, he said, plans are drawn for a 36-foot width road, raised three feet above the present level. At this time he plans to put in one eight-foot half-circle tube to replace the remains of the present bridge there.

Also scheduled for immediate start, according to the Road Commission, is the south

road out of Weidman. Rights of way have been secured to change the direction of the road just south of Frank Thorp's home and follow the old railroad bed, more or less, to meet the south road leading to the Broomfield Township black-top just south of the Gatehouse
