UNE 28-29-3 MILL CLOSES SUDDENLY AFTER MORE THAN 60 YRS.

Holmes Milling Company closed its doors to the public and laid off three of its six men employees without notice last weekend. The mill was established in the 1890's and had serviced farmers on grinding during this long time.

The village of Weidman was stunned at this sudden move, which laid off Will J. Smith, a 35-year employee; Fred Wilcox, also a long-time worker there, and Glenn Mc-Donald. The area's shock resulted from the loss of service to farmers who have brought feed in for grinding. Weidman values its neighbors' business visits.

"Just a change in procedure,"
Bernard Woodruff, president,
said. "We are milling, making flour and the flour mixes, but not for retail sale, only to wholesalers. Our trucks are on the road.

"We'll do no more grind-ing for farmers, and no more retail sales. "

Albert C. Holmes of Grand Rapids, and went under the business name of Holmes & Anderson, during the latter part of the nineteenth century.
