The Barryton Rod and Gun Club, to which Weidman and Beal City belong, were re-sponsible for the planting. They will be planting every fourth year from now on, depending on the surveys and the creel count catches made by the Conservation Department.

This winter the members of the Barryton Rod and Gun Club and those who aren't members will build an artificial walleye spawning bed 60x20x18 feet on the north side of Coldwater Lake on the big sand point. This will be supervised by the Fisheries Supervisor for this area, H. Peterson. The outcome of the spawning is to try and get the walleyes in Coldwater Lake to reproduce.


