The work-bee was spontaneous and voluntary, but a lot of improvement was made in those short, hot hours.

When the bee was about concluded and workers were preparing to go home, Ernie Loomis appeared, ordering everybody off the road and threatening arrest for those who had "stolen" stumps from "his property."

The work-bee ended with a comic-opera finale, with dialogue going as follows:

FRANCES TRANBARGER: But Ernie! Surely you wouldn't object to our just clearing a few places for fishermen to get their lines in, with the mill pond so low and so full of weeds!

ERNIE: The mill pond is low because that's the way I want it. I ordered it to be kept low, and that's the way it will be.

FRANCES: But people just want to come here to fish a while--that doesn't hurt anything, does it?

ERNIE: It's my property and I don't want anybody on it.

CONNIE ROE: Oh, calm down a bit, Ernie. This is a public highway and you don't own an inch of ground along here.

ERNIE: Oh, don't I? We'll see who owns this land! All of you get out of here or I'll have you all arrested! You've been hauling things away off my land.

CONNIE: But those stumps were at the road's edge, in the way of fishermen casting out their lines.

ERNIE: There ain't gonna be no more fishermen. I'm gonna put up a fence along here so nobody can fish here.

CONNIE: But Sheriff Craven and Conservation Officer Roe from Mt. Pleasant have said this is public water, and the public is entitled to use it.

ERNIE: You talk with the prosecuting attorney. Them guys don't know what they're talking about.

Monday morning we called J. Allen Lampman, Isabella County prosecuting attorney, who said he had had complaints from Weidman on the subject, but hadn't had time to look up the law on it as yet.

Meantime, there are some nice places cleared for fishermen along the north-road site. Last week the bluegills were hitting like crazy, and some big ones were taken out.
