It is entirely possible that Ye Ed, among others, may be haled into court or hauled off to jail, by Ernie Loomis.

"He could do the arrests himself," Sheriff Craven said Monday evening. "People just don't realize the powers of a constable--and you elected him!"

"If he does in fact own the road," the sheriff continued, "then you were committing an unlawful act in removing anything from the roadside, such as stumps which he says you stole."

"Also weeds, which we stole from the water?" we asked.

"If they were connected to his ground," the sheriff said.

Four Hurt In Car Accident

Sixteen-year-old James Morford of Coldwater Lake drove past a stop sign on the gravel-pit road at the Weidman Cemetery Monday afternoon at 4.25, according to state police, and collided with a car driven by Robert Reyher of Alma, with total loss of both cars and injury to the occupants as the result.

Taken to Community Hospital were James, with abrasions on the face; Robert Reyher, bruised right arm; Sharon Reyher, 17, fractured left leg; Evelyn Reyher, 39, fractured nose and right arm, and abrasions on knee; and Marsha Reyher, 10, cut over left eye.

Young Morford was given a ticket by state police for reckless driving.

Sunday morning at 8.50 an accident occurred at the Beal City corner on the Weidman road, when Frank King, 17, of Weidman, struck a car driven by Hubert E. Collin of Mt. Pleasant. Frank made a right turn toward Beal City and hit the other car, which had been stopped for the intersection but was over the half-way line.

Collin received a summons for failure to yield a half portion of the main highway, and Frank one for an improper right turn. No one was hurt.

Damage amounted to \$300 to the Collin car and \$200 to Frank's.
