

STATEMENT OF CONDITION

It is the opinion of the Board of Education of the Weidman Community School that the above accurately represents the financial transactions and balances of the district and that all funds were handled in accordance with the generally accepted practices of budgeting, receiving and disbursing of school funds in the state of Michigan.

In pupil transportation, the fleet of seven buses transported 336 students daily to and from school travelling 373 miles.

Total miles travelled by the buses during the year were 67,800.

In the school lunch program 46, 160 hot lunches were served

In the school lunch program, 46, 160 hot lunches were served to students and eachers averaging 270 lunches daily. In addition 19, 100 half pints of milk were served to children at re-

duced cost.

The program offering for the 1957-58 school year will be about the same as the previous year. The Junior-Senior High comprised of 7-12 will be scheduled on a five period day instead of the eight period day as in the past. This schedule is designed to reduce student study hall time and increase time devoted to supervised study. Both student and teacher time should be used more efficiently under this plan.




