Home Nursing Course Offered For Weidman Area

A Home Nursing course is offered by the Isabella County Red Cross, including care of the sick and injured.

The course includes those procedures believed most frequently needed to provide care for an ill person in the home or sick and injured in shelters or other emergency areas.

It consists of seven two-hour lessons in Home Nursing instruction, offering an opportunity to learn to make the best use of time, energy and

material; how to carry out doctors' orders; and how to apply these things in emergency situations.

Homemakers and potential homemakers should learn these skills, the Red Cross points out.

You may acquire this knowledge by leaving your name and address with the Red Cross representative, Mrs. Frances Going, or the instructor, Mrs. Nina Carrick. A post card or telephone call will enroll you.
