NOTTAWA PUBLIC RECREATION MONEY VOTED ON NEXT WEEK

Next Monday evening the qualified voters of Nortawa Township will meet at the Town Hall and decide whether to empower the Township Board to appropriate money from its sales tax and intangi-ble tax fund, for public recre-

ational purposes. On the list of possibilities is the proposition of installing playing lights on the Beal City Public High School's athletic field, near the public school's gym.

Estimations run between seven and eight thousand dollars for this, although no exact figure has been arrived at.

The field would be available to other schools and organizations, it was pointed out this week. It probably would be directed by a board including township board members and representatives of the township at large, besides the school people.

It is our opinion that this project should go through. The township fund for this purpose has money enough for the Beal City project and enough for further projects in other places in the township, possibly Weidman. To our knowledge, Nottawa

Township has never done anything to benefit Beal City through use of township funds. Nottawa has spent funds that will benefit Weidman, notably on the north-road project and the north mill pond bridge project. The township put up substantial amounts for this.

The Weidman Fire Department would never have been established but for the money put up by Nottawa and Sher-man Townships.

If Beal City is allowed its playing lights, it is quite conceivable that Weidman can expect further benefits from proper funds in the fu----0---ture.



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
