Charles Purtil owned the high herd, with 15 cows making 43.4 lbs. of fat, followed by Maynard Gilmore and Son with 25 cows at 40.3 lbs., and Cotter & Myers with 32 cows, also at 40.3 lbs. Fred Hauck, with 26 cows, and Brown Brothers with 32 each averaged 37.2 lbs. of fat for the month.

Robert Recker continued to lead the Association for the first ten months, with an average of 452 lbs. of butterfat followed by Maurice J. John at 420 lbs., Joe Stevens and Son with 388 lbs., Charles Purtil with 386 lbs., Robert Coon with 364 lbs., and R. & R. Recker at 362 lbs. of fat.

NO. 2 JULY REPORT

Walter H. Smith in his July report shows 14 dairymen with 318 cows, and an average production per cow of 828 lbs. of milk and 28.7 lbs. butterfat for the month.

High cow was owned by Russell Davis, with 70 lbs. of butterfat for the month, followed by Arnold House with a cow at 68 lbs. of fat, Robert Clark with one at 64, Norman Gross one at 63, and Herbert Yuncker with a cow at 60 lbs.

Robert Clute had high herd average, with 20 cows making 38.7 lbs. of fat, closely followed by Russell Davis with 20 cows averaging 37.6. Others, in order, are: Wm. Block & Sons, 24 cows at 34.9 lbs. of fat, Ed Schafer, 10 cows at 31.6, and Robert Clark, 17 cows at 31.4.

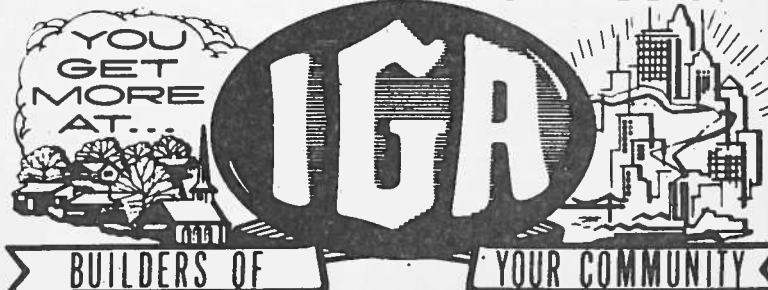

STATEMENT OF CONDITION OF THE SCHOOL DISTRICT

The value of school properties remains the same as last year, at \$2,000.00 valuation of school site, \$130,000.00 buildings and \$24,000.00 equipment. The buildings include 7 high school classrooms and gymnasium. A 4-room building is used on a rental basis and houses the elementary grades.

There are 7 high school and 4 elementary school teachers. The teachers' salary range is from \$3400.00 to \$4400.00, with a salary median of \$3850.00. There are 115 elementary (K-6) and 142 secondary (7-12) pupils, of which number 41 are non-resident pupils. The pupil-teacher ratio is 23 to 1.

Regarding the financial condition of the district, there are no obligations remaining in the Debt Retirement Fund. The Building and Site Fund has \$11,378.69 to be used for future building needs, which amount represents the first year's collec-

tion of a 3-year special voted tax. The over-all valuation of the district for tax purposes has risen this year from \$2,772,610 to \$2,921,258.00. The General Fund for the operation of the school this next year will require 8 mills on that valuation.

The 1957 school census shows 506 children from 5 to 19 years of age. About 250 children attend the Saint Philomena School at Beal City.

Eight school buses transported an average number of 463 pupils with a daily pickup mileage of 154 miles, which included the pickup mileage of the Kindergarten noon route. One new bus will be put in service with the new school year.

The principal change in the high school course of study was the addition of Driver Education classes.

Danger On Our County Roads

Even though Michigan has a daylight speed limit of 65 miles per hour and a night time limit of 55 miles per hour, there are many roads in Isabella County, as in the other counties of the state, on which 50 miles an hour is the safest maximum speed.

Commissioner Joseph Childs of the Michigan State Police says that many of the secondary county roads which are narrow, winding and hilly, were not engineered for top speeds: many accidents on the secondary roads of Isabella County are proof that they will not allow for speeds over 50 miles per hour. Many a driver who drives above that limit either runs off the road, cracks into a tree or hits a bridge abutment. There have been many accidents of this type in Isabella County this year.

Some of the county roads are posted with lower speed limits but these limits are not always

observed with the result that many accidents happen which need not to have happened.

Because of the mounting toll of lives lost on these secondary roads in Michigan, there is a strong feeling growing among law-enforcing officers, highway engineers and safety-minded citizens to establish a 50 mile daytime limit throughout the state on all secondary roads.
