

WHAT THEY SAY ABOUT THE STATE CONSTITUTION REVISION PROPOSAL

A Detroit newspaper said in its Sunday edition:

"Michigan voters haven't heard many candidates urging either approval or defeat of the proposed Constitution revision, on the ballot Nov. 4.

"For the most part this issue is being quietly ignored in the campaign.

"There's a good reason why. Debate over whether the Constitution should be rewritten crosses party lines. . . .

"One reason is that revision is strongly opposed by predominantly rural groups whose leanings usually are Republican. . . .

"They include the Michigan Township Association, which fears that a constitutional convention might change or revise lucrative revenue sources and independence of Townships. Another group is the Farm Bureau. Bureau members like the way the State is apportioned now. . . .

"Lined up with the rural groups, strangely enough, are most of the Democrats. They oppose the calling of a constitutional convention because its makeup would be predominantly Republican. . . .

"(Other) groups lined up in favor of revision include the Michigan Municipal League; Michigan Congress of Parents and Teachers; United Church Women of Michigan; Michigan Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs; Michigan Junior Chamber of Commerce; Michigan Education Association; and other citizens' groups. . . .

"If the voters approve the constitutional convention Nov. 4, there will be several major areas of proposed reform for the convention to consider. . . .

"They include a strengthening of the executive branch of State government, (to lay responsibility for State administration at the feet of the Governor); overhaul of the State tax structure; lengthening terms of office for Governor and the Senate; strengthening the State Legislature; reapportionment; authority for establishing county home rule and federated metropolitan government, and court reforms, including abolition of the justice of the peace system. . . .

Well, there's a little information on it. The Sunday papers had more in detail.

Better Than A Letter

Minnie I. Roe

Minnie Roe died peacefully in her sleep about six o'clock Saturday afternoon, Oct. 25, at her home. She had been ailing for the past year, although she observed her 90th birthday September 10 with a family party which she enjoyed.

Mrs. Roe was co-publisher of the Weidman Messenger, in partnership with her daughter, Constance, and until the last few months she read each page-proof of the paper every week for typographical errors, an invaluable help on the paper.

She and Rolla E. Roe came to Weidman in 1912 and established the Messenger, and they spent their whole lives publishing weekly newspapers in various towns in Michigan. The family bought bigger papers at various times, but always sold them and returned to Weidman, to the Roe place which was their home for over 40 years.

Minnie I. Roe was born Sept. 10, 1868, at Marcellus, Michigan, daughter of Norman and Mary Elizabeth (Savage) Huyck. July 19, 1888, she was united in marriage to Rolla Ellsworth Roe of Buchanan, and thereafter they published weekly papers throughout their active lives. Rolla Roe preceded her in death May 30, 1942.

Thirteen children were born to them, two dying in infancy. Surviving are five of the eleven they raised: Charles H. of Tarrytown, N. Y., Mildred Garner of Fort Myers, Fla., Lois Lawson, Constance Roe and Frances Tranbarger, all of Weidman.

Also surviving are 17 grandchildren, 50 great-grandchildren and several great-great-grandchildren.

Preceding her in death were Marjorie, Dorothy, Winifred, Robert, Allys, and Paul.

Her whole life was lived for her family, and in the early days here she worked in the printshop, washed on a scrub-board, sewed, baked, and cleaned for five children in elementary school here. As the children grew up life became easier for her, but she never lost interest in the paper, nor in caring for her home and family.

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock in the Weidman Methodist Church, with burial in the Weidman Cemetery.

Weidman Well Nears Dundee

Leonard Oil Company's test well in the Weidman park was drilling at 3622 feet Wednesday morning at 11 o'clock, with expectations of drilling in to the Dundee the last of this week or the first of next.

Top of the Traverse sand was logged 15 feet lower than the Drallette well, but it was hoped that thinning might occur from that point to bring the oil-producing Dundee limestone up, proportionately. The position of the Traverse is not necessarily conclusive, Leonard Oil Company said Wednesday morning.

It was pointed out that Shorty Merrill's discovery well in the Rosebush field was low in the Traverse, and came in for a good producer in the Dundee.

It was also mentioned that Shorty drilled three dry holes before he brought in his discovery producer, on Halloween. John Neyer's company drilled four dry holes before they found their discovery well in the Gilmore field. Leonard and Glavin have drilled two dry holes in the Weidman area, the park test being their third attempt here.

Seven-inch pipe was cemented in, and the well will be brought in under perfect control, Leonard spokesmen said this week. Every regulation and precaution is being observed by the Leonard Company on the park well, it being in a town. It will be drilled in, producer or dry, with a master gate and control head as safety measures.

Mrs. Bessie Teall and Earl Hammond are two of the nine children born to Mr. and Mrs. Sylvester Hammond. The family was an energetic

and ambitious one, and the daughter Maude attended Normal College in Mt. Pleasant.

Mrs. Teall recalls that once, when her sister Lena had taken Maude back to her school studies in Mt. Pleasant, driving a horse and buggy, a tornado struck suddenly as she was nearing home, the Hammonds living on the original Ryerson homestead a half mile east of Letson's Corners.

Lena was driving the prized family-pet carriage horse, holding an umbrella over her head as she drove.

The sudden wind turned her umbrella inside out, and as the tornado struck in earnest, Lena crouched on the floor of the buggy, helpless. The intelli-

gent family horse to look he safe-

ly home. Bessie says of her father, Sylvester Hammond, "He kept an open door for everybody. Tramps stopped, and were fed; salesmen were fed and given beds."

The Indian Okemos stayed winters in an old cabin on the Hammond place, near the house. The Hammond children loved "Uncle John," as they called Okemos.

There were no roads whatever, when these first families settled in Coldwater. The state road from Ionia to Houghton Lake was built in 1875.

In those first early days, too, there was no doctor, and women gave birth to their children attended by midwives. Mrs. Mit-

chener is remembered as one of those invaluable men of that time.

Only Earl and Bessie, children of Sylvester Hammond and one of the Ryerson daughters, and Ray Hill, son of another Ryerson girl, Elsie, now living west of Barryton, live anywhere around here, Mrs. Teall informs us. Other descendants of the original Ryerson family live in distant places.

Elmer Ryerson is the only one of the Ryerson children now living, if he is still living. He lived at Hesperia, and Mrs. Teall says the last she heard he was very ill.

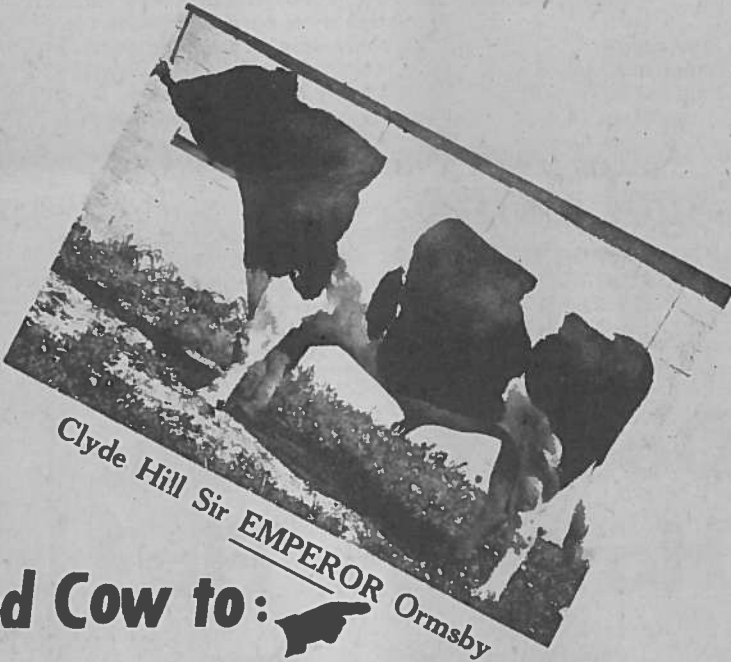

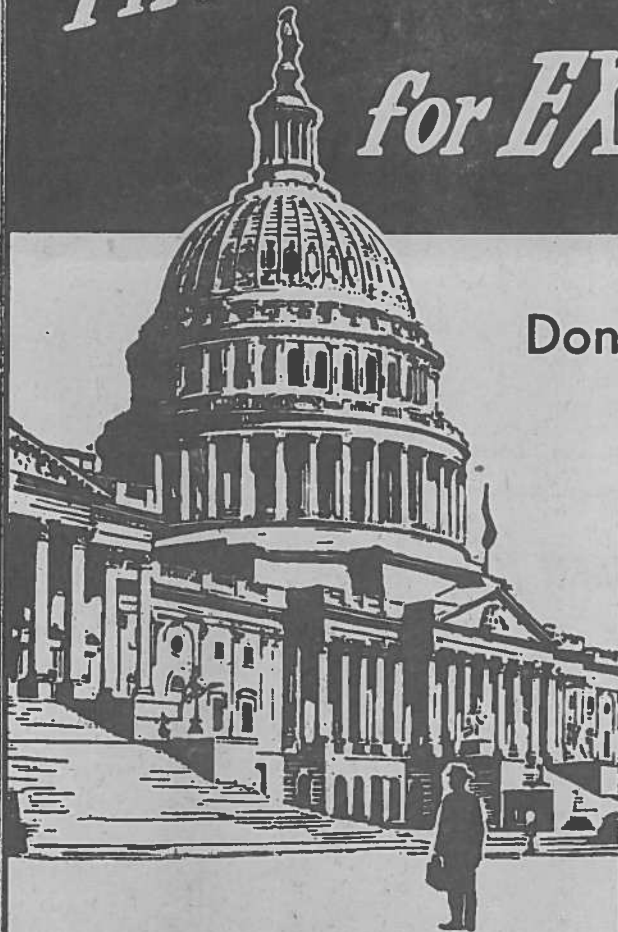
