School Consolidation Election Set for June 7

A special school election is being called for June 7, for the purpose of bringing before the voters the question of consolidation of the two districts of Weidman Community School and the Beal City Public Schools.

Voting at Weidman will be from 7 o'clock in the morning till 8 o'clock p. m.; and at Beal City at the Nottawa Township Hall, during the same hours.

The proposition of consolidating the two districts has been unofficially before the public for some time. Most will welcome the chance to go to the polls and vote their choice in the matter.

The Weidman Messenger invites public opinion, meantime, from citizens of both districts, and will print letters duly signed by the writers although writers do not necessarily have to have their names printed. The newspaper, however, does have to know who writes a letter before it will print it.

The regular school election for the Weidman district will be July 14, when the terms of Mitchell McArthur and Clyde Beutler run out, as members of the Board of Education.

Petition deadline is 4 p. m. June 24 for candidates to fill these posts. Petitions are now being circulated.

for the Beal City district will be June 9, when the terms of Matt Engler and Ragolt Hauck run out, as members of the Board of Education.

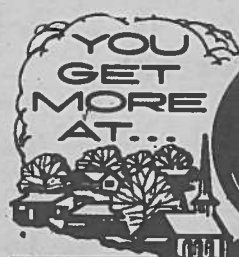

Given Back

(Editor's Note: We are proud to present this dramatic short story by George Skinner. He is well known in lumberjack lore as the author of the Axe Thrower, and has written several good short stories besides his novel. Locally he is known as a good neighbor and owner of Cherry Lane Fruit Farm.)

It was the first of May; and Anson Pettit had had good luck with his new tackle. With pride he lifted the silver clasp of his creel and looked at the speckled beauties. His creel was full.

He decided to stroll up the Little Silver a short distance. Several years ago he had gone up this branch of the river, and had come upon a man and boy, fishing. They had several undersized trout.

He picked up his rod and reel. They were beauties. The rod had cost him fifty dollars, the reel twenty-five. Soon young Billy would be old enough to use them, and he'd give them to his son and buy himself new tackle.

He was thinking this as he came in sight of the elm.

Someone was fishing there today, a man and a boy. Why -- the same man and boy of whom he'd been thinking. A woman was sitting upon the bank. He must be dreaming. He pinched himself. No, he was awake. But how come, the same man and boy? The man considerably older, but the boy just the same. Now they had seen him.

"Howdy," the man said, as Pettit came round the tree.

"Looks as though you were doin' a little fishin' too."

"Yes," Pettit replied, giving them a once-over look. It was the same boy, positively, as years ago. He saw the same little side-drawn smile. The same old cap, much too large.

"You know this stream is closed to fishing, don't you?"

"Yes, mister," the man said. "But, sir, I just had to come today -- for a little while."

"That your Ford out there on the road?"

"Yes," from the other. "What there is of it."

"Why didn't you fish out there where you wouldn't be liable to arrest? I see by your tags and camp outfit you're from out-state. Got a non-resident's license?"

"No, I haven't. It took so much for us to get here, I didn't feel able. Had some car trouble. Don't know, now, how we'll get back. We came because I wanted to see if it might -- if it might really be true."

"I don't understand. You'd better explain."

"Well, you see, sir, it was like this. Fifteen years ago today we were fishin' here, the boy and I. We had a few undersize fish. A warden comes along, sees our small fish, throws 'em all back in, takes the boy's pole, breaks it up and throws it across the creek, tells me to come in next day and settle up, which I did. Cost me twenty dollars."

"Well, I'm sorry," Pettit said. "But you know an officer is supposed to do his duty, regardless of the consequences. Twenty dollars isn't much, you shouldn't complain."

"That's not the cost I'm regrettin', sir. It cost me more, much more." He turned and wiped his eyes.

"I don't get you," Pettit said,

puzzled. "Tell me more about it."

"I'll tell you. Though you'll think me crazy. While I was a-talkin' to the warden, my little boy forded the stream and brought back what was left of his pole. The water was cold. We had to walk two miles home. He took cold, it developed pneumonia. In another week we buried him."

"Mister, the dearest thing I had was taken from me, because a warden was just a little too severe in doing his duty. I don't suppose he ever knew just how much it cost me."

"Seemed like we never could get over it, her and I. You got a boy, mister?"

Pettit was looking around the tree.

"Yes," he said. "I've got a boy."

"Well, the other continued, 'I hope you never have to lose him. As I was sayin, seemed we never could get over losin' ours. We couldn't stay any place. Moved here and there. Sold and lost all the stuff we had. Went way west, to the coast. Seemed I wished so much, during those years, for my boy back."

"Then another boy was born to us out there. One night it seemed like I had a vision as I slept. Seemed like there was a big storm and everything we had was swept away and we were left alone in a little circle of light."

"Seemed then I heard a voice above me, seemed to be the Voice of God, and it said, 'You've lost all you had, but I've given you back your boy.'

"That's why we came back, sir. He's just the same age now as the other was, and I wanted to see if he would just kinda remember. Just a little. It would mean so much to us."

He sat down on the tree roots, head bowed. He did not know his visitor had left until he heard the boy calling joyfully.

"Daddy, oh, Daddy! See what the man gave us! Gee, he's a good man, ain't he? See the nice pole he give me. See the pretty basket. Oh, Daddy! See the big fish! And you know, Daddy, I think the man was sick or somethin', 'cause when he give me these he patted me on the head and I saw he was crying. Here's something he said was for you."

The father opened the small envelope. Something yellow was there. He took it out. It was a crisp fifty-dollar note. A card was with it. The father turned it over in his hand and read:

"J. Anson Pettit, State Game, Fish and Forestry Warden."

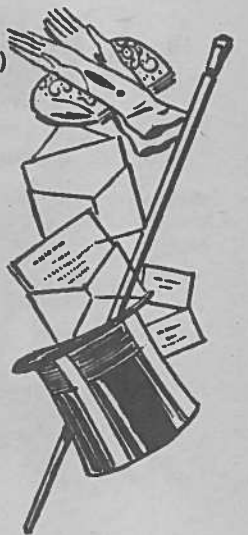

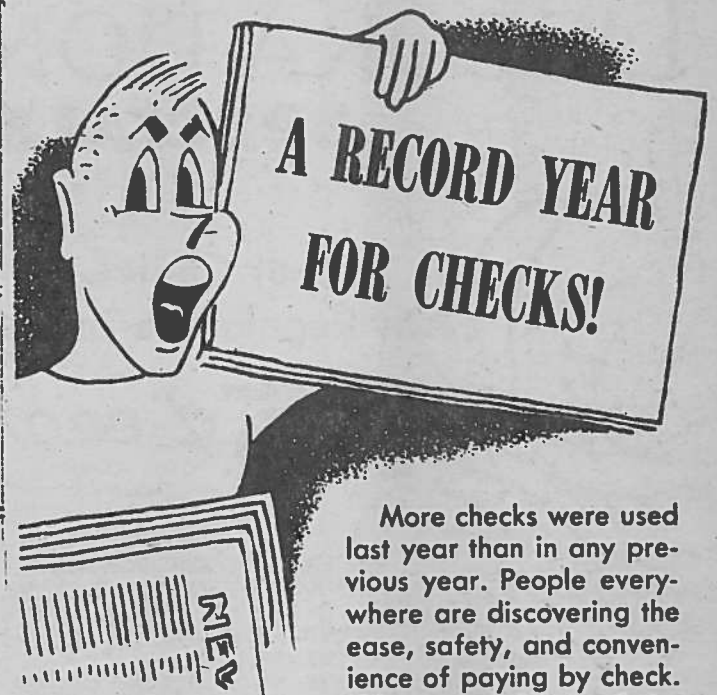
