**NO. 1 DHIA REPORT FOR MARCH**

Fred Zeien, supervisor, in his March report, showed high production for this association. The 19 herds in Isabella Co. include 518 cows with the average cow producing 37.2 lbs. of fat and 1023 lbs. of milk. The five herds in Clare Co. numbering 260 cows averaged 34.1 lbs. of fat and 899 lbs. of milk.

Bob Recker had high herd, with 26 cows making 49.6 lbs. of fat average per cow, followed by Bader and Ley with 20 cows at 46.5 lbs. of fat, and Louis Recker of Clare Co., with 25 cows also at 46.5 lbs.

Brown Bros. had 39 cows averaging 43.4 lbs. of fat, followed by Robert Coon, 44 cows at 40.3 lbs.; Joe Stevens and Son, 30 cows at 40.3; Charles Purtil, 17 cows at 40.3; and Howard Penrose of Clare Co., 83 cows also at 40.3. The county averages include three farms not in the No. 1 association but included in the IBM averages.

Lowell Penrose had highest producing cow for the month, at 88.1 lbs. of fat, closely followed by Fred Hauck with one at 82.9; Brown Bros. had a cow at 82.8, Wm. Florian one at 82.6, Bader and Ley one at 80.4, and Robert Recker with one at 77.4.

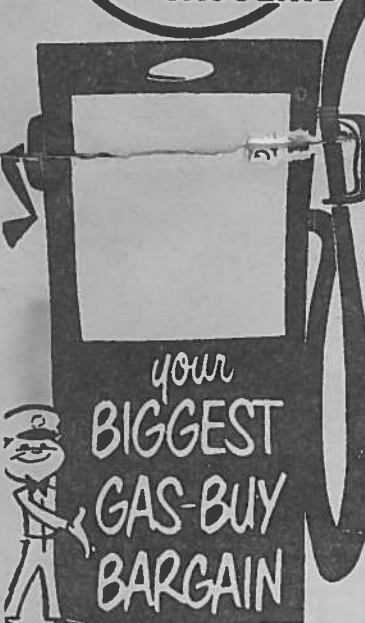

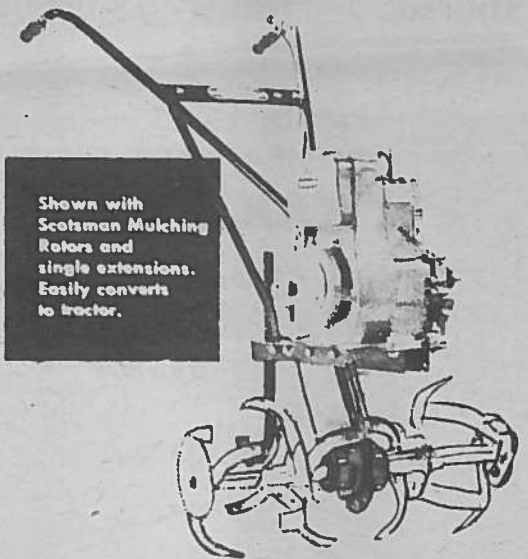

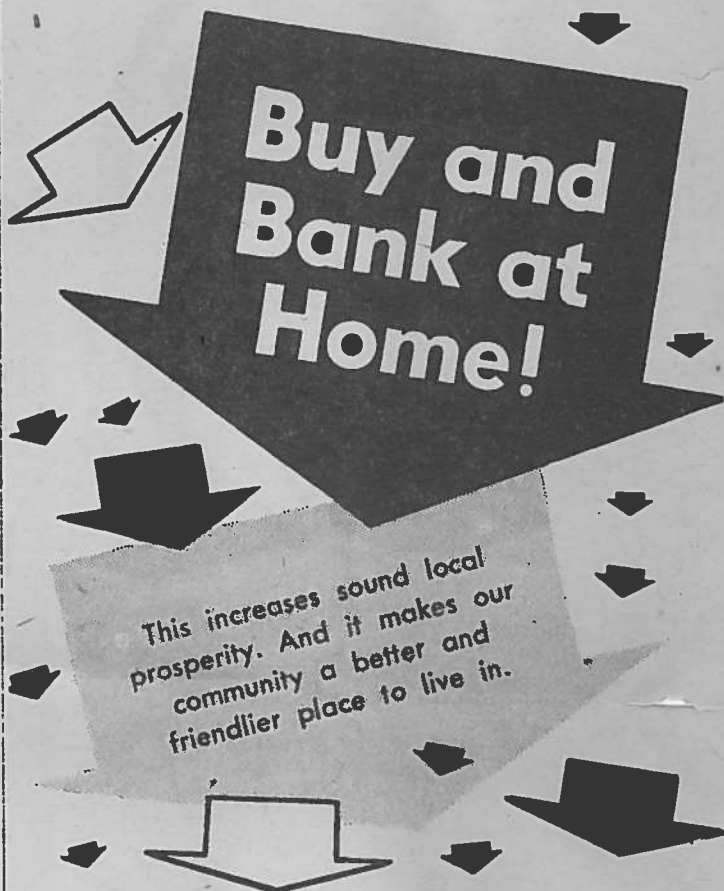
