He has a few blooms on some seedlings of his own; and then he has great heads of hybrid lilles, crosses between the Croft and other, hardier varieties, as well as shades ranging from deep red to orange and lemonyellow.

The white varieties, which look to the layman like huge regal lilles, have crowne of six and seven blooms, the blooms larger than ordinary regals but with pink tracings on the out-side of the bell. We'd say the new hybrids he's trying out are probably the coming thing, to replace the temperamental and

smaller regal lilies.
Then, on Thursday evening, we called at the Martin Boger home in Coldwater Township, and were thrilled at Mrs. Bo-

ger's beautiful flower gardens. There's a gal who can really raise 'em, too. The Boger place is very beautiful, inside and out, with one of those Coldwater Township landscape views from the back steps down across a meadow with a lane winding into a wooded patch beyond. Lucky people, to live with such a priceless view from their back door!

And in Weidman, Peter Esch has his usual weedless garden, with first-to-mature vegetables and a wonderful display of flowers. We noticed he had glads in bloom last week, the earliest glads we've seen this

Jessie Rosencrantz brought in a huge spike of red glads, per-fectly formed, the florets measuring five inches across. This was a show spike in any man's language, true prize stuff. It was from a batch of bulbs she bought from the Flower Shop in Weidman last fall. There were seven florets on the spike, with 17 buds and blooms total, which constitutes exhibition material. Jessie was taking it to Phoebe Embrey.







FOREWORD

By Constance Roe

(Continued from last week)

The great courage and hardihood of the early settlers in Central Michigan cannot be stressed too much. They were true pioneers, coming into this section of the state when there were no roads, no clearings except what they cleared themselves to build their homes.

Last week we mentioned the family of Jackson Alexander, coming to Coldwater Township up from Elkhart, Ind. They had 200 miles to cover in an open wagon, one team of horses drawing them.

Twenty-seven miles north of Ionia they camped for the night in the woods, having left the area where roads were cut and setting out on trails marked by blazed trees through the woods.

Next morning after they had set out again, a wheel on the wagon "dished," forcing five spokes out. A man came along the historical account says, and helped Mr. Alexander bind staves on the wheel rim. Soon after they were on their way again the wheel gave out, this time for good. Mr. Alexander tried using a sapling under the wagon as a drag-device, but it was too much for the horses.

He left his wife and three chi dren there in the woods and walked seven miles to the near est house, for help. There he found he could get another outfit, for a price. He started back to his own outfit, hoping to make it before dark.

He was driving a borrowed team and wagon, and at dark the horses stopped suddenly: a fallen pine tree blocked his route. He sat in the wagon all night worrying about his fam-

They were terrified of bears and other wild animals, and Indians. We have asked J. Foster Otto, an authority on Indian lore in Michigan, if their fear was justified. He says it was not, as Michigan Indians in the 1860's were thoroughly peaceful. Nevertheless, newly-arriving settlers were afraid of them

were afraid of them.

Mr. Alexander went on at first light of day, to find his family at breakfast in the woods, unharmed.

woods, unharmed.
His was a difficult journey to his new home in Coldwater Township, Michigan. He had to spend two days working to pay for the use of the borrowed wagon in order to take it on. They finally arived, going to Mr. Brubaker's house, which was near their claim. They arrived at 10 o'clock at night and received a cordial welcome which included a substantial supper for the weary family, and beds.

family, and beds.

Another instance of white settlers fearing local Indians comes to mind.

I remember hearing Maude Letson tell of Andrew's mother, Mrs. S. A. Letson, getting dinner ready for a logging crew, setting long tables ready out under trees in her yard.

She was alone at the house. As dinner was nearly ready, the yard was suddenly full of Indians, between twenty and thirty of them, in full Indian dress.

The chief indicated that

they wanted food. Shaking so that she could hardly move, Mrs. Letson brought food out and the Indians silenty sat down and ate. The complete dinner disappeared in five minutes.

As by a signal, when their plates were empty, the Indians got up and disappeared into the brush at the back of the house.

When she could, Mrs. Letson started gathering up the dishes.
Each Indian had left a silver dollar under his plate.






