Here's hoping the ads will continue to come in for the Weidman Messenger so you can keep it going for years yet.

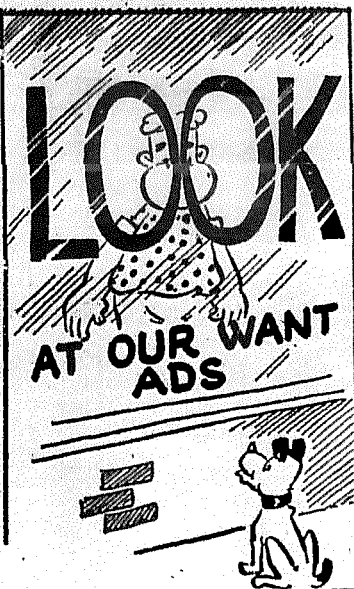

## FIRST VINCENT REUNION HELD SUNDAY

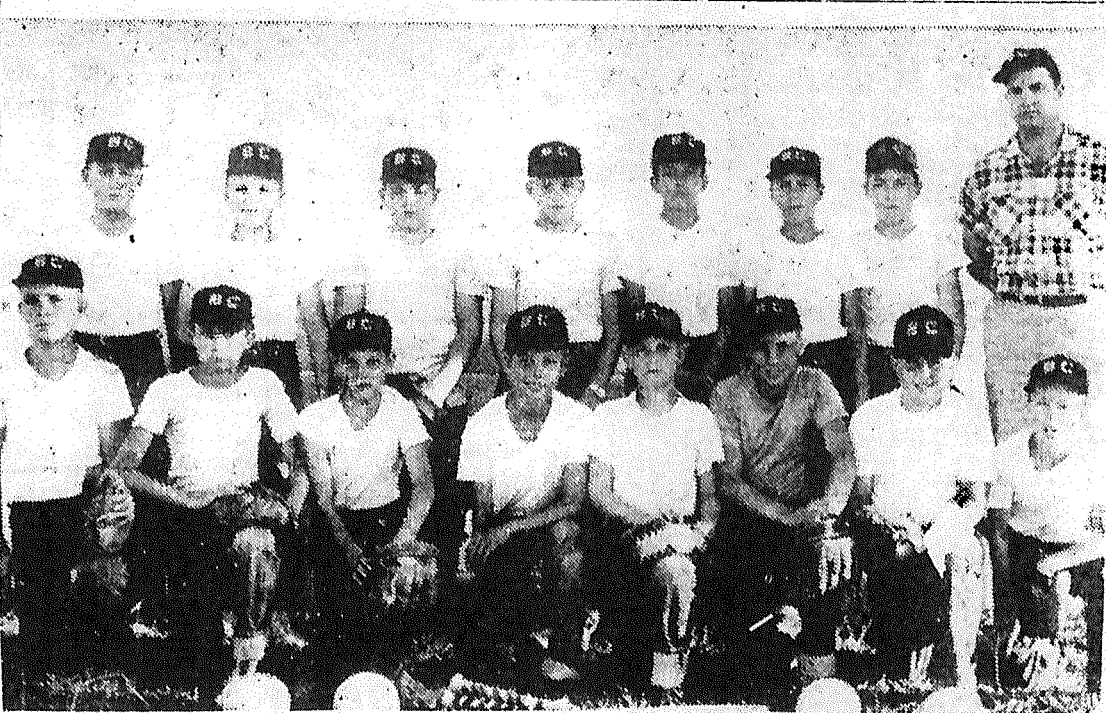
The first annual Vincent family reunion was held Sunday at Crystal Lake Park, with 47 families and 90 members present.

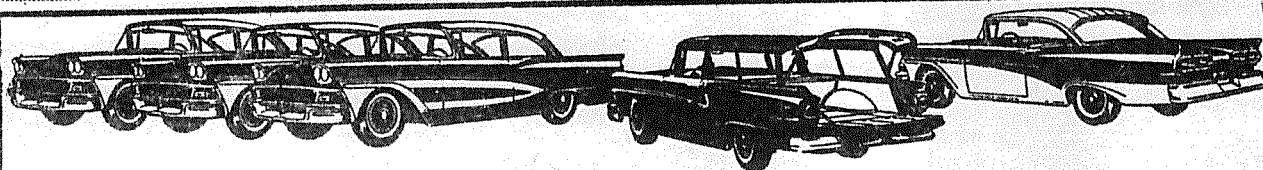

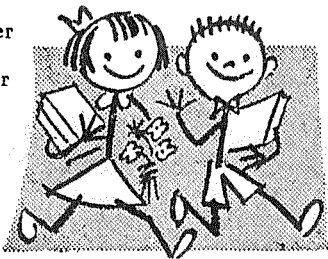

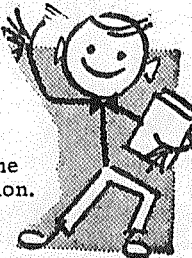

Briefly, the student is protected coming to and from school, at school, and at school-sponsored events either at or away from the school. The annual fee is \$2.00. Enrollment blanks will be sent home with the children. Parents are neither urged nor requested to enroll by school authorities, it is simply a service that is available if the parent desires the service.
