Ye Ed asked if Ernie could do that legally. "I don't know the law, I just enforce it," Henry said. "But I'd guess Ernie has a right to put up a fence on his property."

"I'd hate to take sides, over there," Henry said. "Anyhow, I think it would take a court-case test to prove anything over there."

That seems to be the only recourse we have.

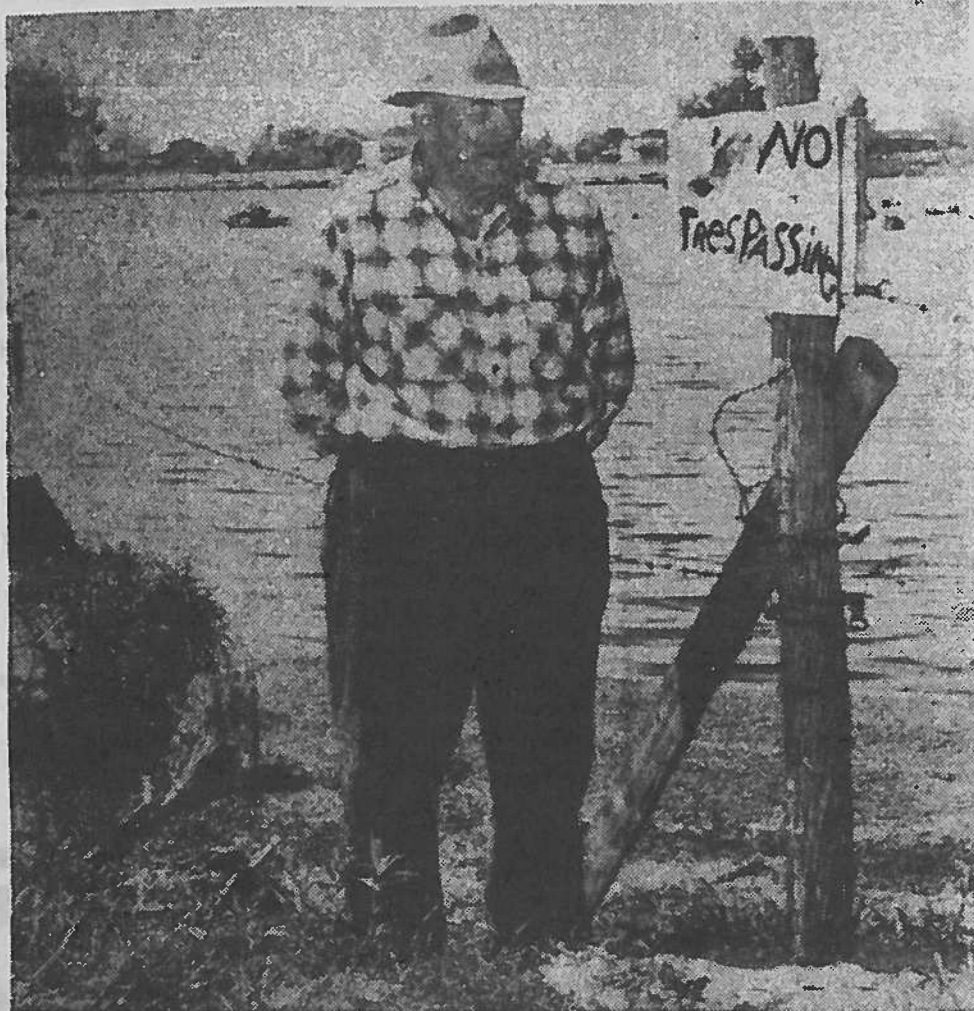
