**WEED CONTROL PROGRAM
PLANNED FOR WEIDMAN POND**

The Weidman Business Association is starting a definite plan to clean out the Weidman Mill Pond and facilitate the very fine fishing for which the Pond is famous.

Tuesday morning E. Victor Scholl, owner of Modern Weed Control Service of Grand Rapids, came to Weidman to look over the Mill Pond, see what could be done about the weeds, and give an estimate of cost.

His estimates were encouragingly reasonable, at 30 cents per shoreline foot to clear 200 feet out in the water.

A projected area beginning at Momany's Point, south along the west shore of the Pond, east along the south shore (at the dam) and north to the Harry Herman land, would cost less than a thousand dollars, Mr. Scholl estimated.

"You have a good lake here," he told Mitchell McArthur, president of the WBA, Tuesday. "The weeds are healthy--that may not look good to you people, but it is good. This fishing site can and should be saved."

An early November date will be set for a meeting of the WBA, the Weidman Lions Club, and all interested individuals, fishermen and land owners, will be set soon. Mitch said Tuesday. Mr. Scholl will be at the meeting to explain

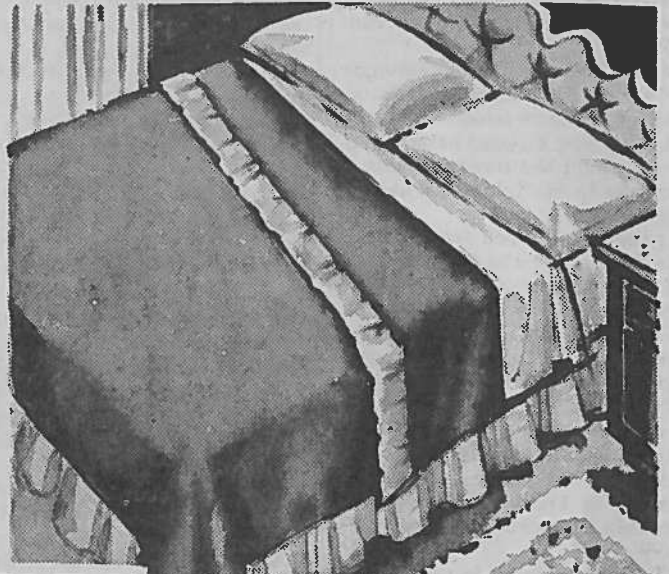

Mrs. Alice Kimball of Barryton was also a visitor of Mrs. Clark. She also is an old friend, and related to Ted Waite. Mrs. Clark recalls that when the families moved to Brinton, the family of Mrs. Clark in 1891, she walked four miles to play with her nearest neighbor, Alice (Waite) Kimball. That was in April, and the small Bertha Reynolds walked through the woods, as was the custom and necessity of that time.
