Editor's Column

NEXT TUESDAY WILL BE
A DOOZY OF A DAY

Next Tuesday, Nov. 3, will be a doozy of a day for voters as they enter the election booths with their hands full of ballots, including the general, or the bedsheet, ballot. (It's the size and shape.)

Theoretically, you're given three minutes to mark the ballots and get out of the booth. Next Tuesday you'll have five ballots to mark within that time. (No, our township election boards will not push you out of the booth if it takes a little longer. That's the theoretical law of it, and we mention it only to point up the slightly ridiculous job shoved at the voter next Tuesday.)

Fortunately, we can still vote the straight-party ticket at least for this year. Attempts have been made to compel the voter to mark each and every candidate, even if you're voting straight Republican or straight Democratic. This is the proposal for the "Massachusetts ballot," which you will vote on next Tuesday. Our plea is to vote NO on this proposal, as you never again can vote your straight-party ticket if this referendum passes.

As in most national campaigns with any contest, the whispering campaign gets going about this stage of the battle. The current one is that if elected, Barry Goldwater "will take away your Social Security checks."

Nothing could be farther from the truth (he couldn't if he wanted to, and he doesn't want to), but a lot of elderly folks are believing it.

Next Tuesday's election will be a mess on account of the township ballots thrown in with the Presidential and general election ballots, along with the Massachusetts ballot, a liquor proposition for Sherman Township, and a few other odds and ends all tossed at you when you go to vote.

But--GO AND VOTE! You will vote as you see fit, but our stand is unshakably for Goldwater for President, along with his running-mate, William E Miller; and the straight Republican ticket right down the line, and conservative non-partisan. And above all, read and understand that referendum on the so-called Massachusetts ballot, which would take away forever your right to vote straight Republican or straight Democratic party lines, and in our opinion would create chaos in our elections and in our government (we've got enough of that as it is).

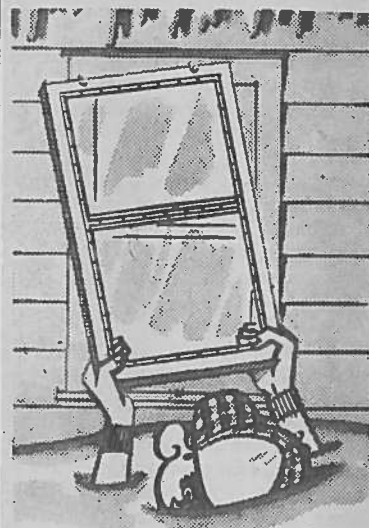

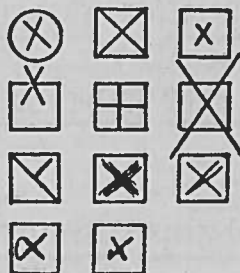
