At its regular monthly meeting Tuesday evening, the Weidman Business Association decided to rerefund over \$200 in donations received for cleaning weeds out of the Weidman Pond, and do the first part of any cleanup and development of shore lines for fishvelopment of shore lines for fish-ermen and bathers itself. After the project is started, the WBA will welcome any and all contri-butions and help from any source: The Weidman Pond is teeming with fish, good sized fish of all kinds, but aquatic weeds were

worse this summer than most of us have ever seen here.

This week Raymond Tilmann re-

ported, for the Ojibwa Recreation Area, and specifically Lake Windoga, a new cottage going up by Vic Graham of Rosebush, who is doing the work himself. He is a carpenter by trade, and is building a good-looking substantial lake home.

Ray also reported four cement foundations on lots owned by Allen Lumber Co. of Weidman, who have five lots in all. Other cottages have been started on this lake, and its prospects look good.

Ray said they probably would start to lower water levels in Lake Windoga this week in preparation of sanding beaches and preliminary work on the next lake, Minnetonka, adjacent to Windoga.

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



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
