

# Safety Council **Issues Answers** To Questions

In answer to several calls received recently concerning public safety, the following statement was released by the Isabella County Safety Council.

(1) Younger children who ride

bicycles on the sidewalks must be considerate of pedestrians sharing the walkway. The pedestrian really has the "right-of-way" and should not have to jump out of the way of an oncoming bicycle.

(2) According to state 1 a w, bicycle riders on streets, roads and highways (except where prohibited on super-highways or by special city ordinance) have as much right to the use of the lanes as any motor vehicle as long as the operator obeys all traffic regulations, signs, etc.

(3) In answer to parents whose children must walk in streets because of the absence of side-. Sidewalks must be petitioned for. Available from the city offices, the petition must be signed by 51 per cent of the owners of property in the block on the sides of the street where the sidewall is desired.

(4) Construction sites provide the perfect atmosphere for tragic accidents. Examples are falling from rafters, falling into

water-filled holes, being covered with sand sliding from mounds. Parents have the responsibility of knowing where their children are, keeping them away irom areas where new construction is taking place.

SAFETY COUNCIL URGES PARENT TRAINING FOR KIDS ON BICYCLES

Did you ever try to ride a bicle, without brakes, or with a loose chain, or with three-foot handlebars, or with loose wheels?

You might say that it would take a circus performer to ride a bicycle in this condition. But you would be wrong. Many parrents, according to the Safety Council, allow their children to ride bicycles in this or even poor er condition.

Let the family automobile develop even a small squeak and parents dash to a garage to have it fixed. On the other hand, they will allow their children to ride bicycles that are dangerous and unsafe mechanically.

We allow children to ride into a maze of traffic which is controlled by hundreds of rules and regulations, without first giving them the knowledge to cope with these traffic conditions.

Children are allowed to ride on slippery and icy streets. Sometimes they carry bundles, packages and other children on the bicycle with them. This may be done to such an extent that vision and even balance are lost.

What can parents do? In the first place, parents should recognize the bicycle as a means of transportation, not as a toy to be used as a child sees fit. A bicycle on the street or highway subjects its rider to all of the hazards of vehicle traffic. This includes col-

lisions, sideswipes, and other destruction of property and life.

Make sure your child knows the basic "rules of the road". This includes traffic signs, signals and local ordinances.

If you want to know what kind of automobile driver your son or daughter will be, just observe his or her bicycle riding habits.
"Recklessness" and taking chances with a bicycle inevitably lead to the same thing in automobile driving.

Most children will better understand the purpose behind traffic regulations and penalties thereof if parents would enforce some regulations of their own concern ing family bicycles.

For example, the following violations and penalties could be used as a starting list:
TWO ON YOUR BICYCLE: No

bicycle riding for 1 week. TRICK RIDING ON THE STREET: No bicycle riding for a month.

HITCHING ON CAR OR OTHER VEHICLE: No bicycle riding for 3 months.

If children are taught to treat their bicycles with proper respect and that sharing the street or highway involves obligations and intelligent actions on their part, then great strides will have been made in reducing bicycle accidents now and automobile accidents in later life.

Some of this teaching can be done in school and by law en-forcement agencies, but the bulk of the responsibility lies with the parents.

Promote bicycle and traffix safety in your family. It may save your life or the life of a family member. ---0---
