### Editor's Column

PEOPLE ARE READING "NONE DARE CALL IT TREASON"

So we find, since last week's issue came out, that more people than you'd think are reading John A. Stormer's spine-chiller book, "None Dare Call It Treason."

The book is being bought in quantities and sent to friends, relatives, anyone who will read it. And I think it should be read.

The November elections will tell all. Senator Barry Goldwater is putting out the first hard-hitting and to the point campaign since the 1930s.

This year, perhaps too late, we do have a clear-cut choice. We can get our foreign policy changed and our domestic affairs in some sort of order, if we want them that way.

It's strictly up to the people, of course, and nobody can predict what the Nation as a whole will do at the polls. But for the first time in lo, how many years! -we do have a clear-cut choice.

WHAT PRICE MODERN EDUCATION?

A few weeks ago we received a news release from the office of Dr. E. J. Brenner, director of the Central Michigan District Health Department, and we didn't print it because we just couldn't be-lieve that modern education left the teenagers so ignorant.

Dr. Brenner's release wound up with the statement, "Our teenager know very little about venereal diseases." (A state-wide survey.) I called schools, and, No, we

don't teach anything about that in our modern Preparation for Liv-

ing curricula.

spokesman from Dr. Brenner's office and I agreed that the most effective education on this subject would be the appearance of an outside authority, perhaps a representative from the Health Department, to stand up before our school kids and give them the information straight from the shoulder, no punches pulled and no information withheld (medical authorities agree there's only one way you can get syphilis or gonorrhea.) This information, authori tatively given, should relieve the minds of most youngsters and warn the few who need warning.

Our modern education is wide of the mark by omitting this crucial if gruesome detail of education. And that thought leads me to

# Report 528 Completed Red Cross Swimming Program This Summer

A total of 528 children and adults received Red Cross Certificates in Water Safety in Isabella County this summer, according to local Red Cross officials.

In this 50th Anniversary of Red Cross Water Safety programs, Isabella County can be proud that it is moving steadily toward the goal — "Every American a Swimmer, Every Swimmer a Lifesaver."

The Red Cross sponsored water safety program at Coldwater Lake this summer resulted in over 200 persons receiving instruction. 142 persons either learned to swim or improved skills necessary to receive a Red Cross Certificate. Seventy-three Swimmer's Cetificates; 22 Advanced Beginner; 22 Intermediate; 16 Swimmers; 5 Senior Lifesaving; and 4 Basic Canoeing in the program of instruction.

The Red Cross employed Mrs. Larry Morganstern, a Red Cross water safety instructor, who directed the program. Response was so great that it became necessary to ask some financial assistance from the Isabella County Board of Supervisors. Red Cross officials today announced that they wished to express thanks to the Board of Supervisors for the \$120 additional funds to help with the program.

Red Cross records show that in other water safety programs in the county 386 certificates were issued. This includes M t. Pleasant City Recreation Department's program, 4-4 Camp at Coldwater Lake. None of these totals include swimming classes conducted at CMU, but are all community classes conducted, in the most part, for the benefit of Isabella County youngsters.

All Red Cross programs are made possible by your contributions to Red Cross, through the Isabella County United Fund.

FRANK THORP GOES WEST FOR THE WINTER

Frank Thorp, at our request, stopped by and gave us a roundup of his winter schedule before leaving last Thursday morning for Casper, Wyoming.

Frank is a retired person who is having a ball out of life, mainly through his interest and acquired skill in a "Rock Hounds" club he joined several years ago in the

He is what we'd call an expert on choosing and cutting semiprecious stones, and has left gifts with several Weidman friends and relatives. He gave George and Connie a beautiful oblong piece of honey onyx, which we are proudly using purely as an ornament.

Frank joined a "Rock Hounds" club, which organizes field tours, to discover desirable stones, and which has an adequate workshop in which to grind and cut the stones to desired sizes and shapes.

Frank makes pen sets of the gorgeous stones, and jewelry, of all kinds; and he loves it. He is sponsoring a club himself this year he told us, in China Lake, Calif.

The Rock Hounds clubs are primarily for elderly folks, though many youngsters want to participate, Frank says. Membership is restricted to ages 17 to 100, as machinery for grinding the stones is power-driven, and younger kids are not allowed on them.

Members work with such fascinating stones as the tiger-eye which is purchased, from Africa; and they also have to buy petrified asbestos, redstone and blood-

stone. On their field trips they may (and do) find treasures in jade, in Wyoming, and agate and jasper in California. The Rock Hounds Club is a national organization.

Once, Frank said, he cut an agate in half and the middle surface showed a perfect Scottie dog. Another time he cut one and found he had a perfect duck as design. "You're liable to find anything in agate when you saw it in two," Frank told us.

He makes pendants, brooches, bracelets, rings, and larger items such as desk pen sets, from these beautiful stones.

Frank intended to visit Mr. and Mrs. Don Thorp in Casper, and Mr. and Mrs. Nelson Loomis. Then his route indicated Brecken ridge, Colo., to visit Harold Thorp's family, at Frisco, and Mrs. Fred Harris (Frances), then on to Washington State or Califor

A few days ago, Kate (Mrs. Jack) Cotter called and asked if common petunias would seed themselves."They've been so pret ty this year," she said, "I want the same kind next year. We thought if we didn't do any spading or digging in the petunia bed, some of the seeds would come up next spring."

"That's right," I told her, "they will. And you're right about not disturbing the soil, too. Petunia seeds are very small, and if you do much digging, some of the little things are going to be covered too deep and their sprouts never will make it to the top."

If you like a riot of color in your petunia bed, it's a good idea not to let too many white ones go to seed, or you're apt to have too great a proportion of white blossoms next year. If you have too many plants in the flower bed when they first start to bloom next spring, yank out most of the whites. This will leave just the colors you like to have, to make seed. Kate and I agreed it's best to thin them out, anyway, before they get very big. Leaving many plants close together will result in overcrowding, and none of 'em will do any good. One plant will attain a size that will amaze you, if you give 'em room to expand.
"Some of my petunia plants

wouldn't go into a bushel basket,' Kate said. This gives you some idea of how far apart they should be after thinning.

Kate's been gathering seeds from a few of her favorite annuals. This is a good thing, unless the annual is a hybrid, in which case next year's plants won't run true to form and may revert back to some insignificant ancestor

If you're a gatherer of seeds, make sure they're dried properly before you seal 'em up in an envelope on which you've written the name of the flower and the date. Improper drying causes seeds to mold, destroying the life inside.
