Then Blanche Carr, our Two Rivers news writer, called to say it was taken on the Chippewa River just back of the Carr home. Blanche wrote, in her news letter:

"The river scene on the front page of last week's Messenger was taken on the Chippewa River back of the Mrs. Elton Carr place. We had it printed on our Christmas cards several years ago."

Our comment is that the Chippewa River is beautiful, any place you take it: beloved by many for its "old swimming holes" and for its good fishing; and perhaps most of all, for its beauty.

It was taken last spring, on the island on the back of the old Roe place. Few people realize there are such secluded and wooded areas immediately around Weidman.

### HERE'S THE INEVITABLE HOUSEHOLD HINT

We can't resist passing on a household hint we discovered all by ourselves.

For years I've bought mayonnaise or salad dressing in pint cans, glass jars, and the temptation to save them and use them in canning is irresistible. I have at least two or three dozen of the things.

Last summer I ran into trouble getting lids to seal on these cans, and George finally figured out the reason.

I was using the regulation jar rings to tighten down the tops when canning, and the doggone little salad-dressing jars have a different kind of neck and the regulation jar rings are too wide or high to permit pressure down on the hot lid so to seal it.

So--I rounded up the old covers for these almost-authentic canning jars, and lo, they worked. It's not quite so satisfactory to use these cover-up tops as to use the regulation ones, as you can't see how you're doing till the jar cools, you remove the top and see if the durned lid sealed. But I'm using those doggone pint jars.

Some years a certain brand of lids will seal for me, and some years the same brand is blotto. I change brands, after a couple of canning failures, and usually this does the trick. This year I canned six pints of apricots three times before I waked up and changed my brand of lids. Maybe the same brand will work for you when it won't for me. Heaven knows I'm no expert on cooking and baking and canning secrets.

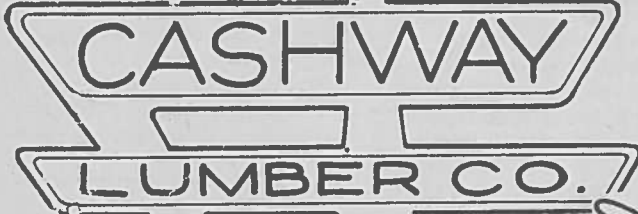

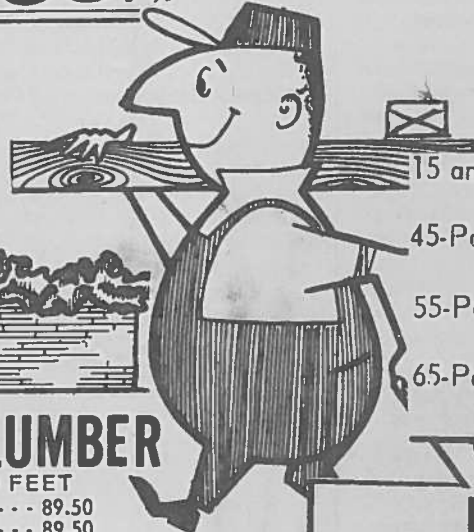
