Here's how some of the fish shanties looked on the Weidman Pond Saturday morning. A freak weather condition, allowing these fish-houses to become marooned and derelict in a relatively small area while most of the Pond had eight-inch good ice.

The shanties that went under were on or near the north channel of the Pond.

About 15 men from Beal City and Nottawa decided to save their own and anybody else's house they could.

They did well. It was a near-impossible job, but not for ice-fishermen with fishing shanties at stake. Here is shown how they put 4x6's under an edge of a shanty to pry it up, and then get a rope around it. The shanty they are working on in this photo was wellnigh submerged.

They got 'em out. One by one they went into the laborious routine of prying, lassoing, and then heaving the shanties up out of the water and thence across the ice to safer locations.

That stuff they're sloshing around here in isn't ice with snow-caps on, either. It's water. There was too much water on the ice for comfort or complete safety, in the rescue operations.

Messenger Photos Graham Studio FISH SHANTIES THREATENED IN FRIDAY, SATURDAY THAW

Freak water conditions threatened a good number of fish shanties on the Weidman Pond last Friday and Saturday. Four shanties sank, but were retrieved. Several nearly went through the ice but rescuers from Beal City hauled them off just in time.

With ice eight inches thick on the average, Friday's quick thaw and Friday night's and Saturday's winds kept water lapping around the shanties over the channel of the north stream through the Pond, and by Saturday morning their situtation was definitely precarious.

A work-team of about 15 men from Nottawa and Beal City went to work with six-inch timbers and ropes, plus plenty of man-power, and hauled off the threatened shanties, including those that had sunk through the ice.

Russell Tilmann, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Tilmann of Beal City, got drenched with icy water when when he went throug thin ice and was immediately rescued.

Kelvin W. Chambers of the Weidman Community Schools has announced his resignation as superintendent, effective as of Aug. 1. He is completing his second year at Weidman.

He came here from Carsonville,

He came here from Carsonville where he was principal and then superintendent for a period of seven years. Previous to that he had served nine years as math and science teacher at Barryton.

Mr. Chambers has accomplished a great deal for the Weidman School and the community, in the short time he has been here.

The Weidman School was a dubious proposition when he took the helm in 1963, and he has put the school on an even keel and increased harmony in the community as a whole.

Among his endeavors which were successful while here, he has enlarged the school's curriculum; worked for getting the district back into accreditation; put the school library into a separate

(Continued from Page 1) room, considered an impossibility before; worked out a special education program with other superintendents, and brought the program to Weidman, for pupils from the Beal City and Blanchard districts.

One or two special education rooms have been planned, financed, and are ready for building on the Weidman School.

There have been no property transfers from the Weidman District since Mr. Chambers took over as superintendent. This year several parcels of land have in fact come into the district, the latest being those of two families with school-age children.

Mr. Chambers has been conservative in spending at the school, and has appeared to have had the interest of the school and its students greatly at heart.
These are a few of the accomp-

lishments of Mr. Chambers in his two years here. There are others, and his many friends will regret his departure as head of the Weidman School.

Mr. Chambers is Chairman of the Advisory Committee on Special Education to the County Board. He is a director of the Isabellah county Safety Council. He is a member of the Masonic Lodge, and of the Lions Club.

The Weidman Pond fishing has been rather poor the past week.

Seems barometric pressure has been low, and with the moonlit nights, the weather has been un-favorable.

Reports are coming in which indicate Littlefield Lake has been producing some nice catches of bluegills, especially in the Tower Lake section.

A week ago some real nice catches were made on the Weidman Pond, which indicates they are still there. No one needs to be afraid to drive on the Pond at this time (Tuesday), as ice is safe except where shanties went through. Brush has been placed as warnings at those spots.

Smelt on Littlefield Lake are reported very slow. However there are about 20 shanties there and sooner or later the smelt will bite.

Smelt fishing on Littlefield is relatively new, but of late years a regular smelt village goes up each winter, just out from the public landing.

Some big smelt have been taken there, running eight to ten inches, a good size for smelt.

Big and Little Evans Lakes in the Martiny chain are reported nil on bluegills the first of the week.

Dear Stanley and Tess:

and am taking the occasion of wishing you both a very happy and prosperous New Year.

Receiving that card reverted me to the past, and reminded me of so many times we spent happily together, and so many things we did. One thing that often comes back to my mind and that I will never forget is the times we used to drive twenty miles or more to go five or six, on a call five or six miles away, and had to walk three or four miles on that nice, smooth cone; where, if we made one false step we sank in up to our necks. You walked ahead and carried the heaviest grip and broke the road. Those were the times when a fellow appreciated the help of a true friend.

I presume you sometimes sit and think of me as I do of you, and wonder how I am getting along

with my 95 years.

Well, you know how many epi-demics of flu I went through and had patients cough in my face when they were at their worst with it, and never took it; in fact never had a sick day in my life since I can remember.

At the age of 92 I was suddenly taken with severe pains, had a fever, and the pains getting more and more severe. Called a doctor and he didn't know, either.

I couldn't imagine it being the flu, but that's what it turned up to be, and believe me, I had it right. Was in the hospital for ten days but finally recovered and

have been feeling fine ever since I was at my nephew's for a few years after I retired, while I was young, at eighty. As long as I could do a little work and putter along on the farm I got along all right, but when there was nothing more I could do I got restless and lonesome. It was something new to me, because I had never been lonesome in my life.

I moved to Windsor, right across the river from Detroit, where I can take the bus at the front door and be in downtown Windsor in five minutes or downtown Detroit in ten. I am now in an old folks' home, a nice new building about 400 feet long, with 125 others.

This building is on the banks of the Detroit River, with a beauti-ful lawn between the building and the river, where all the big freight boats ply between Chicago and Duluth and Buffalo, boats four to seven hundred feet long. The river is less than a mile wide here where it curves south to go to Amherstburg and Lake Erie. As you look up and down, you can nearly always have a boat in sight. Just now, of course, the season is closed, but a few of them run all winter. There is always a good view of Detroit.

I also belong to the Senior Citizens Union. They have those in practically all of the big cities. It is a large hall where retired people or old people gather five days per week usually, and have all kinds of games, cards, espectrectived your card in due time ially for old ladies, shuffle boards

and pool tables, etc.

I must not forget singing and dancing. Every union has a choir that practices once or twice a week and those choirs visit other unions and sing for them, and other choirs do the same. They dance twice a week, but mostly on Friday. That day I never miss I pass up the square dances and others I don't care for, but hardly ever miss a waltz.

At our house they always give a party once a month to all those whose birthdays come in that month. For Christmas they mixed it with Christmas, and the Christmas had two Santa Clauses, one a big fellow about six feet, and another little Santa Claus.

About the middle of the doings, when we were all drinking our share of wine and eating little sweeties, little Santa, all dressed in red, masked, and with a beard that ran down over her chest and something over her head that was neither a hat, a crown or a babushka, grabbed me by the shoulders from behind and said, "Come on, let us dance!" I was so surprised that I didn't know what to say, but the orchestra was playing a nice waltz so that told me what to do. She happened to be a very good

partner, and our step agreed very nicely. We danced between the tables.

I forgot that I had reached for another sheet and thought I was running out of paper. That is why I was writing on the margin. You are likely both asleep by this time anyway, so I had better* call a halt.
