Allen Lumber Company was nearing completion of its cement and steel structure dam at Wilcox's Point in Weidman this week to create Lake of the Hills, about 100 acress of water on Walker Creek and in the village of Weidman.

Tuesday workmen were completing setting up forms for the south side of the uprights, with pouring of cement of this last major detail scheduled for this week.

Two small piers in the center of the structure remain to be erected, but these are minor details, compared to the huge project of building the main portion of the dam.

All structures are of steel-reinfornced cement, and all details are carefully checked by engieering departments and the engineer retained by the Allens.

Last Thursday Mr. and Mrs. Alton Allen drove to Lansing to take samples of concrete to the Michigan Testing Engineering offices. Tests from concrete in the bottom section were rated above average. These tests are made for breaking strength, and the Allens' dam is being constructed strictly according to all State regulations and tests.

In the near future there will be a stream of water running through the dam, Alton Allen said this

week.

The Allen Co. bulldozer is kept busy on clearing and preparing for lake bottom, and on the Drallete 80, to the northwest extremity of the lake, there is a body of water where the bulldozer cleared and sheared off banks, putting sand from bottom up on the sides for beaches. By next spring it is expected the lake will be completed, and the Allens expect the spring rumoff to assist greatly in filling the lake to specified levels.


Sure was nice to take the whole month of October to do this and visit everyone too. We found relatives all fine.







THERE ARE BIG FISH IN THE WEIDMAN MILL POND

Last week Friday George Skinner landed a 14-pound, 36-inch pike on the Weidman Mill Pond, with hook and line, of course, and a good-sized minnow from Walt's Bait Shop.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT WARNS OF HUNTING DANGERS Fishing and hunting are probably two of the most healthful activities that people can take up for recreation, Dr.E.J.Bren-ner, director of the Central Michigan District Health Department, said this week. However, there is also a harmful side to hunting, he pointed out. Accidental injuries and deaths from firearms are not the only hazards.

How many people over 40 have a physical examination before hunting season opens? Dr. Brenner aşks. Including a heart checkup? Many men who are overweight and/or in poor physical condition expect their hearts to take on the additional work load of strenuous exercise in the field, walking many miles through snow or mud, climbing over fallen trees or up hills for extended periods of time, after having a nine or ten months' fitness campaign of sitting behind a desk.

As all good athletes know, over exertion of a muscle which is in poor condition can lead to a lame back or sore arm. Your heart, says Dr. Brenner, is also a muscle, which needs a relatively long period of adjustment before it can adequately function in the hard task a hunter must meet. Use moderation and good judgment when hunting, he urges. Carry back the game you catch, but don't be carried back yourself.

Carbon monoxide is another hunter's hazard. Sportsmen, be-ware of the silent killer--colorless, odorless carbon monoxide gas--produced whenever any kind of fuel is burned, Dr. Brenner warned. Death stalks from improperly vented heaters in hunting cabins and fishing shacks. Be sure all appliances, especially gas refrigerators, stoves and heaters are checked annually and are vented properly. Do not be the unsuspecting victim of carbon monoxide gas. ---0-
