

OJIBWA RECREATION AREA COMES THROUGH AGAIN! -- Hunters on the Ojibwa Recreation Area got 10 bucks Saturday, opening day of deer season, three more than last year's record kill of four on opening day and three more the second day. All deer hung up opening day on the Ojibwa Area were eight and 10 pointers, with not a spikehorn in the batch. Young Steve Tilmann, son of the Richard Tilmanns of Ojibwa Area, had his first hunting experience at 15 years of age, getting his buck the first day. Eight deer were shot by 10 o'clock a.m. Saturday, then another was added, to make the nine shown in the photo above. Another buck was taken Saturday, to make the count 10 for opening day. Ojibwa hunters wear membership arm bands for identification, and

the area is closed for hunting except by Ojibwa Hunting Club members or invited guests.

The Ojibwa Recreation Area is on a deer feeding and control program, with corn and oats in planted areas for the deer, and control as to numbers of hunters allowed. This makes for wonderful hunting. It is reported that more bucks have been seen on Ojibwa, and new fawns, since the feeding program was instituted over a year ago.

DEER HUNTING EXCELLENT IN THE WEIDMAN AREA

Deer hunting is excellent again this year in the Weidman area, with early kills reported throughout the week.

First to be reported to us was a six-point buck bagged by Bill Wilcox about 6.30 Saturday morning, opening day. Bill got his early deer about five miles north of Weidman.

Bob Embrey of Farwell got his buck also Saturday, near the old Roy Embrey farm southwest of town. Bob and his family spent Sunday with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Roy S. Adams, on the north edge of town.

Also on opening day, Shirley West, wife of Elwyn West, Jr., of Flint, got a six-months-old buttoned buck north of the Grass Lake Road on an antlerless deer permit. Both Shirley and Elwyn thought it was a doe, till it was inspected by Conservation checkers at US-27, when it was determined it was a young buck.

Rusty Alwood returned home from the Swan hunting party at Iron River Tuesday evening, without a deer. He went out Saturday in this area and shot a nice seven-pointer. Mr. and Mrs. Fred Swan and their hunting party returned Saturday evening with one in their party with a deer.

These are by no means all the deer taken out of the Weidman area. They are merely the kills reported to the Messenger. And they are apart from the Ojibwa Hunting Club's wonderful firstday record, told elsewhere in the paper.

All these are besides the wonderful haul by Ojibwa Hunting Club members and friends, told elsewhere in the paper.

At the Straus Processing Plant in Nottawa, it was reported Monday they had 74 deer carcasses, 20 which had come in early from Upper Peninsula hunters, who had a chance to get their bucks before Lower Peninsula hunters. Carcasses were coming in very heavily Monday afternoon, Pete Straus said.

Last year the Straus plant processed (cut up and wrapped) 140 deer, Pete said, with expectations, based on early figures, about the same this year.

Of Monday's deer carcasses at the plant, 54 were taken in the Weidman area. All directions from town appear to contain deer if there is wilderness.

Though many farms and areas have been closed to public hunting, there are still enough good places to go and get that buck right around Weidman.

We'd say this area has one of the best deer-kill records this past week of any place in Michigan, not excepting the Upper Peninsula.


