

Influenza Outbreak Likely This Winter, Brenner Says

An influenza outbreak appears expectant mothers, diabetics, palikely this winter, Dr. E. J. tients in nursing homes, and people suffering from chronic heart, trict Health Department, warn-circulatory or respiratory a iled today. He urged residents to obtain flu shots as early as possible.

The flu warning is based on the two -to -three -year cycle of the disease. The last major outbreaks in most of the States were in 1962-63, and on the West Coast in 1963-64.

"Flu vaccination is the most effective known protection," Dr. Brenner said. "The vaccination is easily done and takes little time. It is administered in two doses, about two months apart, but those vaccinated within the past two years will need only one shot."

Immunization is particularly recommended for senior citizens

ments.

Dr. Brenner offered these basic precautions to help guard against the threat of flu: Wash hands frequently, avoid crowds, and be particularly careful if your job requires that you come in contact with large numbers of people - try to keep a safe distance from those who are coughing or sneezing.

"But the most important thing," he emphasized, "is to see your doctor about immunization before influenza strikes."
