MARCH IS NATIONAL RED CROSS MONTH

March has been designated as National Red Cross Month, and the Isabella County Chapter will conduct a campaign for members and funds during the month. In the year of 1964, the local Red Cross handled a total of 651 cases in Service to military families: active duty servicemen and veterans.

Veterans were assisted with pension applications, admissions to

VA Hospitals and other benefits to which they were entitled. Over 200 active duty servicemen were helped obtain emergency leaves.
