To the Editor:

My wife and I came to Weidman two years ago, and have decided to make it our home. We like Weidman--but we don't like the way the Isabella County Road Commission ignores the terrible road conditions around here.

I realize that the east mile of blacktop out of town is a catastrophe and that it will have to be torn up and rebuilt. But I have heard that the Road Commission plans to let it revert to a gravel road--a primary county road and the lifeline into Weidman!--and I think that is the ultimate insult to the town of Weidman and to the people who would drive over that road.

No area in Isabella County has as bad roads as the western half. The Air Line Road is disintegrating. Other roads are going, and are ignored.

More people drive to Mt. Pleasant and Midland and other distances daily to work from this area than any other like area in the county. We pay road taxes, gasoline taxes, and all the other taxes that are supposed to be used to maintain roads.

The stock excuse for neglect of the road which is the east approach to Weidman, I am told, is that "The old bridge would have to be rebuilt and there's no money."

To that I say, Baloney. Bridges are built on other roads all over Isabella County.

The town of Weidman is suffering financially, as travelers and truckers are taking the school road south to M-20 and bypassing the town.

When are Weidman people going to wake up?

## Floods Threaten Area Dams, Lake

### WINDOGA LAKE DAM SAVED BY HEROIC EFFORTS

Frozen ground below, thawing ground on top, melting snow, and rain worked together to create flood conditions over much of Isabella County Saturday and Sunday, especially in areas having streams or lakes.

The dam at Windoga Lake, on the Ojibwa Recreation Area tract, was saved by heroic measures Saturday when fast-rising water went above the dam's capacity and threatened to go over the embankment.

Big bulldozers were employed by Leo Gatehouse's men to dig one emergency spillway, first, on the west side of the lake, while they waited to see if that would relieve the menace.

Water was coming downstream too fast, however, and between 9 and 11 o'clock Saturday night a second spillways was dug out and the dam was saved, suffering no damage, the owners said.

By Monday morning, water was receding, and danger was over.

A farm pond on Duane Gray's place, above Lake Windoga, overflowed, taking out the overflow tube, but the dam tube held, it was reported. Nevertheless, a huge amount of water overflowed there, and that, together with melting snow and rain, and the lay of the land in the Walker Creek watershed, created flood conditions. Roads were flooded generally in the west section of Isabella County, especially on Walker Creek and the Chippewa River.

Harry Phillips' Chippewa Vista recreation development on the Chippewa River northwest of Sherman City was reported flooded. There are around 200 cottages in that development.
