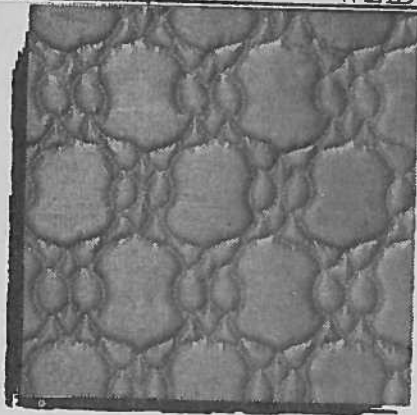

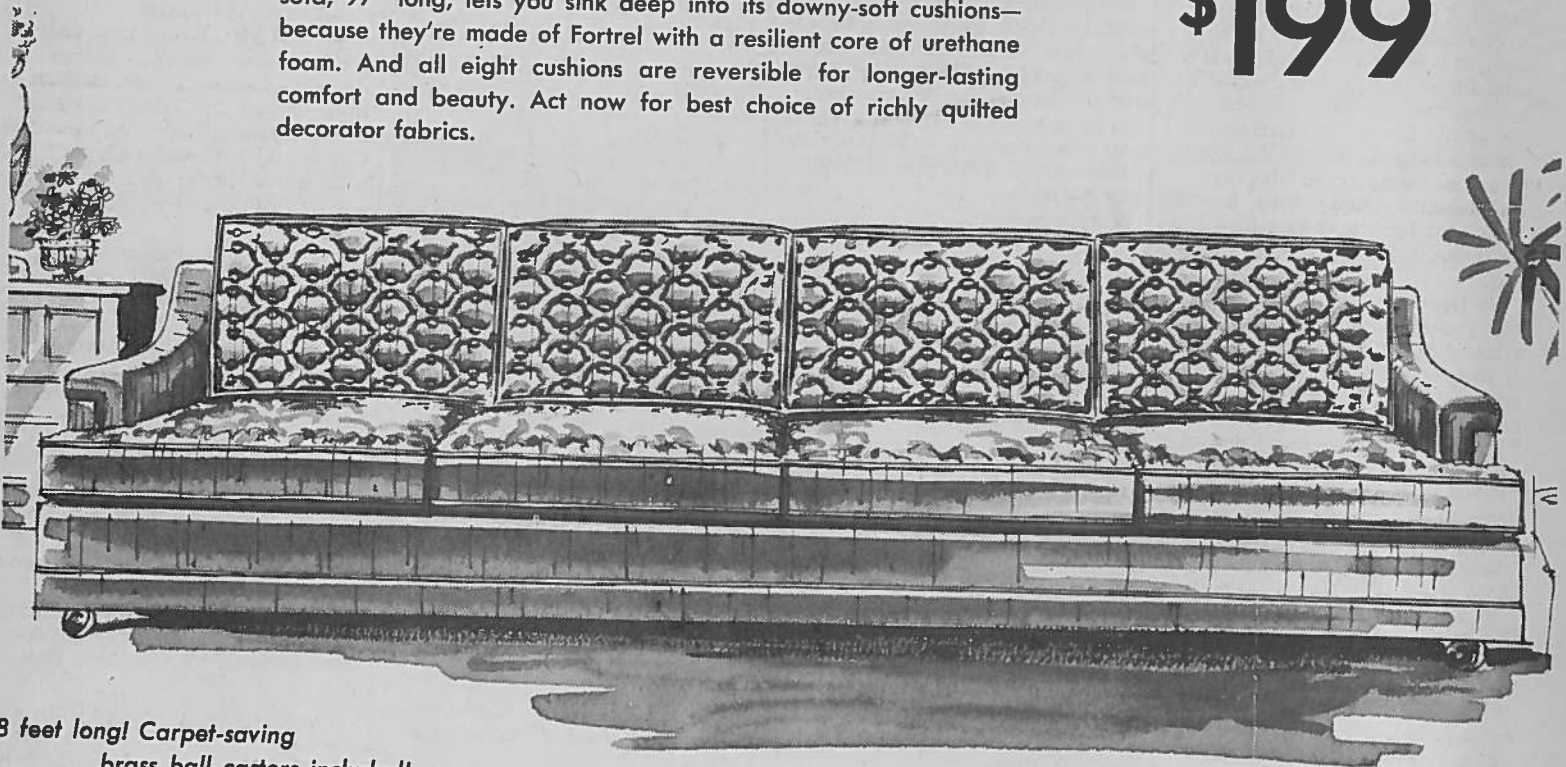

DR. RONDOT
WRITES TO HIS FRIENDS

To my friends in and around Weidman:

I received so many cards and letters for my birthday that in order to answer them all I would have to hire a stenographer with an electric typewriter, so I am taking this means to reach all of you. Many wrote me for the seventh and many more for the 14th, which is the right date.

It is extremely heart-warming to receive so much correspondence with so many kind wishes for my welfare.

Even from California, Florida, New York, and other states, came reminders from friends that I had not heard from for 40 years or more. Some seemed surprised about me retiring into an old folks' home after leading a rather active life. They have no cause to worry.

I always loved to read, and never had the opportunity to do as much of it as I wanted, except medical journals and books, but that was more like work, beneficial, but not very amusing. Now I can relax and concentrate on something more entertaining. I am thankful that my eyes keep good and never tire after hours of reading.

The next diversion would be the Senior Citizens' Center. They have those in every city of any size. It is what you might call a club for all old people, especially, but the line between old and not so old is not very definite.

It is a large hall with all kinds of amusements, card playing, shuffleboard, pool tables, battle-dore, shuttlecock, tennis, bowling but especially singing and dancing.

We have a choir of 40 voices that practices twice a week, and a lot of individual and community singing. Also an orchestra of seven pieces. Some of the members practice three times a week. They are very generous, and play us anything we want for dancing.

Others ask me, "What do you do to keep yourself apparently as young and active as you are?" If I had a formula I would gladly share it.

The only thing I can think of that has contributed greatly to my good health is that I have always been a fresh-air fiend, always slept with my window open, even in below-zero weather; was never afraid of a draft or night air. You may imagine I had no trouble getting into that Senior citizens' Center, being a little more "Senior" than any of them.

The last party I went to I got the prize for being the oldest one there. According to the name of this club, you might think we are all old. Of course, we don't take in teenagers, but if you could see us dancing when our or-

chestra is in full swing, you'd forget about old age.

There are many, of course, who prefer to sit at tables and play cards, dominoes, or checkers, but the majority of us take part in more strenuous sports. Most prefer dancing to anything else.

We have parties for all occasions, and sometimes create occasions to have parties. Every month we have a special party for all those whose birthdays come in that month. We have a special table set for them, and they all have to blow out the candles before sitting down to the meal.

When I was 17, I was clerking in a store in this town, playing a cornet in the town band. The first thing I had to learn was to take a long, deep breath and blow hard or easy, as required.

I followed that exercise occasionally through life, as it is recommended by health instructors. When it came my turn to blow, I not only blew all the candles, but blew two of the candles off the cake.

When I was living here, this was a town of 10,000. Since then it has grown to 200,000, and puts on all the airs of a big city.

Two years ago they put up an auditorium that is large enough to accommodate such plays as Oklahoma!, South Pacific, Russian Ballet, and Cleopatra, which we have had here lately and are really worth seeing.

With Detroit just across the river, with its many attractions, there is no excuse for being lonesome. I took in a play at Cobo Hall lately, and My Fair Lady, a play that has been running in New York for four years and is now in Detroit.

Hoping this finds you all well and hearty.
