Of that we're kind of proud. We started up the Messenger last June for two reasons: First, to pay the grocery bills (we hoped). Secondly, because we believe the town of Weidman is standing on the verge of becoming the center of resort-development trade, and will prosper and grow.

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WEIDMAN BUSINESS MEN BUY AQUATIC WEED CUTTER

At a special meeting Monday evening, the Weidman Business Association voted to buy an aquatic weed cutter, the Manette "45" from the Aquatic Controls Corp. of Milwaukee.

The weed-cutting machine can be operated on a 12 to 14 foot rowboat, according to Howard W. Stern, president of the corporation.

This is an alternative to control by chemical spraying, long considered and investigated by the WBA.

The machine is expected to arrive and be in operation within two weeks.

The Weidman Mill Pond is now down in water depth, due to re-

pairs for the dam, it was reported at the meeting.

Weed cutting will be begun at the time when the water is down, and later the level will be raised to make better fishing and maneuverability of boats.

Chemical spraying would eliminate only a portion of the varieties of weeds now flourishing in the Weidman Pond, it was ascertained last week. By the cutting method, any portion of the Pond, and any amount of weeds can be controlled, depending on the enthusiasm of men willing to work on the boat with the cutter:

Work will be on a voluntary basis, at least at first, it was agreed Monday night.

Weeds cut and removed from the water constitute valuable fertilizer material, the corporation men pointed out. In all probability, this fertilizer material will be available as weed piles ac-

cumulate on the Pond shores.

Donations will be necessary to complete the purchase of the machine, which will run about \$620 or a little more, laid down here. Fishing enthusiasts who like the Weidman Mill Pond and its great big bluegills may contact any business man for more information as to monetary help from any source.

ETIQUETTE OF THE STARS AND STRIPES

Compiled by Esther Skinner, Sec., VFW Auxiliary, Mt. Pleasant

(Editor's Note: We suggest that the following instruction in the handling and displaying of the American flag should be filed in a safe place by every citizen, and that it should be also in school libraries, and in business places, for knowledge of the etiquette of displaying the flag.)

It is the universal custom to display the flag only from sunrise to sunset.

The flag should be hoisted briskly, and lowered ceremoniously.

The flag should be displayed on all special days, weather permitting; New Year's Day, Inauguration Day, Jan. 20; Lincoln's Birthday Feb. 12, Washington's Birthday Feb. 22; Easter Sunday, Loyalty Day, Mother's Day, second Sunday in May; Armed Forces Day, third Saturday in May; Memorial Day (half staff until noon), May 30; Flag Day, June 14; Independence Day, July 4; Labor Day, first Monday in September; Constitution Day, Sept. 17; Columbus Day, Oct. 12; Veterans' Day, Nov. 11; Thanksgiving Day, fourth Thursday in November; Bill of Rights Day, Dec. 15; Christmas Day, Dec. 25; and such other days as may be proclaimed by the President of the United States, the birthdays of States (dates of admission to the Union), and on state holidays.

The flag should be displayed daily, weather permitting, on or near the main administration building of every public institution.

The flag should be displayed in or near every polling place on Election Days.

The flag should be displayed during school days on, in or near every school house.

When displayed over the middle of a street, the flag of the United States should be suspended vertically, with the Union (the stars) to the north in an east-west street, or to the east in a north-south street.

When carried in a parade front with other flags, the United States flag should always be to the marching right of the other flags to the front and center of the flag line.

Do not display the flag of the USA with the Union down, except as a signal of dire distress.

Do not let the flag of the United States touch anything beneath it, such as the ground, floor, water, or merchandise.

On Memorial Day, May 30, the United States flag should be displayed at half staff from sunrise until noon, and then flown at full staff from noon until sunset. The United States flag should be flown at half staff at other times only on Presidential proclamation.

When displayed otherwise than being flown from a staff, the

United States flag should be suspended so that its folds fall free. Whether hung horizontally or vertically, the stars, or Union, should always be in the flag's own upper right corner, or to the observer's left.

When the flag is placed upon the grave, see that it will not touch the ground. Do NOT leave it there indefinitely. In Arlington and other National Cemeteries, flags are removed the following day.

A United States flag may be mended, washed or dry cleaned (Federal Code Sec. 4 j) and proper usage provides that when the flag is so badly torn, soiled or faded, so that it is no longer a fitting emblem for display, it should be destroyed in a dignified way, privately, and preferably by burning.

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SANITARY REGULATIONS GO INTO EFFECT FIRST OF JULY

The Isabella County Board of Supervisors has adopted Minimum Sanitary Regulations which will go into effect on or about the first of July, 1965.

All new or reconstructed home sewage disposal systems must have a written permit and an inspection by the local health department before the installation is covered over with fill dirt, a dispatch from the office of Dr. E. J. Brenner, director of the Central Michigan District Health Department, said this week.

Last year 33 sewage investigations were carried out by his office. A total of 55 private water wells in this area were reported as being unsafe for human consumption. (This was in the Central Michigan District, not our area alone.)

Dr. Brenner's office is carrying on a campaign to educate the public to awareness of the importance of clean and plentiful water, and its conservation.

A recent dispatch from his office states:

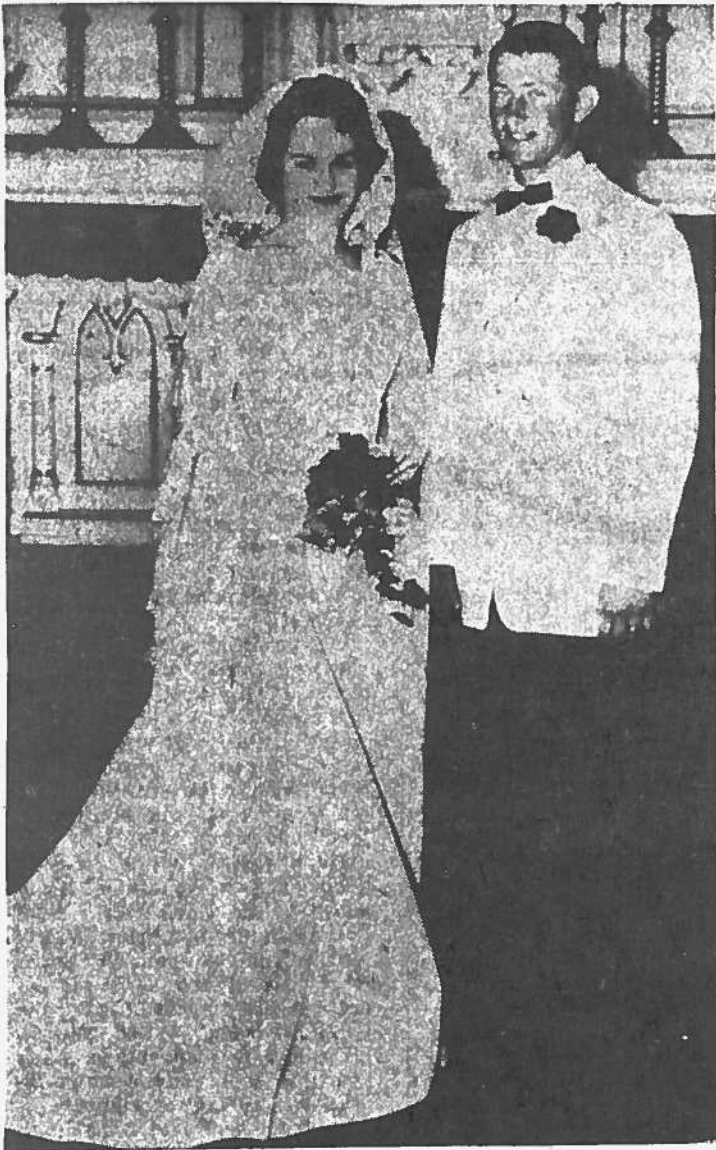
"All liquid wastes from the kitchen, bathroom and laundry must enter your septic system. There is no proof that soapy water is bad for septic tank operation. All liquid wastes, including those containing soap or detergents, should drain into the septic tank.

"The liquid leaving the septic tank is by no means pure, and may contain disease-producing micro-organisms. This liquid must not run into any open ditch, stream, lake, storm-water drain or onto the ground surface.

"Any questions pertaining to water or sewage disposal should be directed to the Central Michigan Health Department, 1213 South Drive, Mt. Pleasant.

"To obtain a permit to construct or reconstruct a septic system, contact your local Supervisor, city clerk, local contractor, or local Health Department for the proper forms and information."
