WEIDMAN TO GET ANOTHER

Recreation Development

The Isabella County Board of Supervisors unanimously approved a proposal to construct a dam and spillway on the west side of the Weidman Mill Pond Tuesday afternoon about a quarter of five.

A new lake will be created, of around 78 acres or thereabouts, to be known as Lake of the Hills. It will extend northwest along Walker Creek for about a mile.

Landowners involved in the project include Calvin Ohls and Ted Bissas, Mr. and Mrs. Fred Wilcox, Mr. and Mrs. George Skinner, Mr. and Mrs. Walter J. Smith, and Wendell and Kenneth Drallette.

Allen Lumber Company proposes to build the dam and develop the lake area.

Its greatest advantage will be the fact that it will lie adjacent to two blacktop roads: The north road into Weidman, and the Air Line, West out of town.

No other lake in the state, we believe, has this advantage of complete wilderness so close to blacktop roads.

Calvin Ohls of Mt. Pleasant is spokesman for the group of landowners, and he and his attorneys

requested speedy decision by the Supervisors on account of the time element.

It is hoped to complete the dam and spillway this summer, clear the area this winter, and begin filling of the lake with the spring runoffs.

Lake of the Hills will be one of Michigan's most beautiful lakes, with picturesque landscape especially on the Walter Smith place, and an island mainly on the Skinner place in Weidman.

Efforts to make this lake a reality have been going on for years, by all parties concerned.

The Drallette section is remote and wooded, while the Wilcox lots will be right in Weidman Village, as will be some other d lots along the lake.

The Ohls section of the lake area, like the Skinner section, will be widely varied, from sunny, sandy field lots to sudden and deep wilderness areas. All areas are easily accessible.

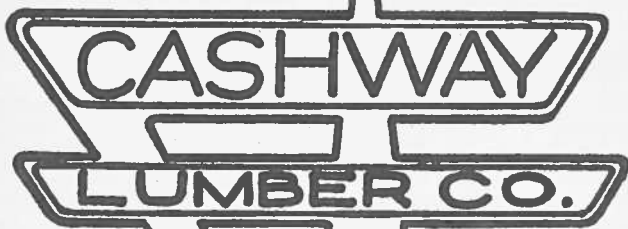

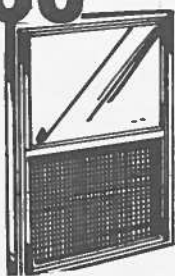

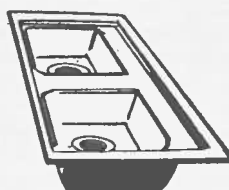
