Ruth Momany returned last week end after spending most of the summer in Colorado, where she went for surgery on her right ear, resulting in a miraculous restoration of hearing.

The delicate operation is performed by a specialist, of course, who uses microscope techniques and instruments.

Her hearing was almost completely restored in that ear, after years of almost complete deafness and the use of hearing aids.

In a card to us before she left Colorado, Ruth said, "My hearing is just wonderful, and I can hardly believe it, for it's truly a miracle."

She spent the summer partly in Denver, where the operation was performed, and then all over the state, visiting relatives she had not seen since the 1920's.

She drove both ways, alone.

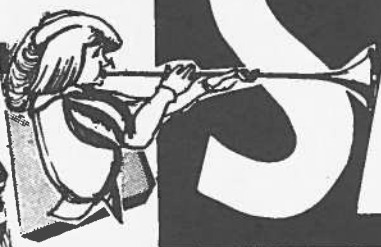
