WE MISQUOTED SHERMAN TOWNSHIP CLERK IOLA MILLER LAST WEEK

We misquoted Sherman Township Clerk Iola Miller in last week's column, on being registered in order to vote in the upcoming November elections, including the proposition to incorporate the Village of Weidman.

What lola said was that voters must be registered in order to vote. If you registered with your township clerk within the past two years, you're eligible to vote now. If you voted in any township election within the past two years, you're automatically registered. In other words, once you register, you stay registered if you vote at least once in two years in a township election.

Where we goofed was in discussing school elections. If you are registered with your township clerk, you're reigstered as a voter in the Weidman School Distr ict. Eligibility to vote in school elections depends on being registered with your township clerk.

So: If you voted in the November, 1964, township and state elections, you're registered now to vote again Nov. 8. If you have not voted in a township election since before 1964, we hope you registered with your township clerk so you can vote Nov. 8 this year.

We make this correction to rectify any impression that the Sherman Township Clerk gave us a foggy interpretation of the election laws

election laws. It was just Ye Ed who was foggy.
