JOE KANE MAKES NEWS IN FLORIDA AREA

Blanche Cliff loans us the following clipping from a paper apparently situated in Melbourne, Florida, liking Weidman's Joe Jane to the late Will Rogers.

Here are excerpts from the clipping:

Earthquake maker or "seer" of earthquakes to come?

Not many miles south of Melbourne--down Roseland way--is a "Will Rogers personality" who performs rope tricks, magic, and fancy rope spinning just as the famed Oklahoma humorist, movie star and columnist did back in the Thirties.

Our Roseland resident—Joe Kane—isn't as famous as old Will Rogers was prior to his death in a plane crash in Alaska with famed flier Wiley Post. But Joe could become a fellow more famous than Will, whom Joe Kane resembles in many ways.

Joe Kane has an uncanny talent-beyond any magic-for predicting earthquakes! He appears to know as much about the dynamics of mother earth as any seismologists who, for example, staff the geology department at Columbia University.

You'd think Joe had a "divining rod" to tell him when earthquakes would come-there'd be no holding back his fame. He could sell the divining rod to help anyone know when some geolo-



gical storm is ready to happen 10 to 20 miles beneath their feet!

Our Roseland earthquake prognosticator has predicted quakes and days or weeks later had them confirmed by Columbia seismologists! But unlike the ancient "divining rod" of the rainmakers— Joe has no such sapling of magic powers.

"Predicting earthquakes is no problem for me," says Kane, with no loss of gracious humility, "but it's pinpointing the location. I only get that part correct about half the time."

Humm...? Only about half the time....!

Recall the mild San Francisco earthquake last year?

Or, again, the two cities of La Calera and Los Angeles hit hard, causing panic and damage to houses, but no deaths in Chile? Or the earthquakes that occurred in Japan March 13 and 16, the latter quake one of 6.5 magnitude?
