SO WE HEAR FROM OUR FOLKS FROM FLORIDA

After our recent worryings over our home-folks wintering in Florida and some in the path of the recent terrible tornadoe there, we have heard from several as they arrived back home in cold old Michigan.

Mrs. Melvin Ockert was first to call us, saying they arrived safe and sound, and the tornado passed over their place, but appeared to jump over their immediate area, and they and their belongings were unharmed.

Mrs. Alva Cummins called Monday morning, saying they were home, and their area was not in the path of the Tampa tornado. Ruskin, they said, was not in any tornado path that has hit Florida as yet. Floyd Dutcher, who also was in Ruskin for the winter, returned also, last week.

Mr. and Mrs. Leo Neubecker, at Tampa, were a quarter of a mile from the most devastating touch-down of the tornado. It was a narrow storm, about three blocks wide, Elizabeth told us Monday morning, but it stayed low and laid waste beautiful homes on Florida Avenue, where the Neubeckers were, for miles beyond the untouched place of our Weidman people.

Mrs. Neubecker said the storm struck exactly at 8.30 p.m., and it was pitch-dark, and raining as she had never seen it rain before. Electric power went off, and the tornado did its terrible damage in total darkness.

"People were just beginning to dig around in the rubble of their homes as we left for Michigan," Elizabeth told us. "The ruined section was within walking distance of our home for the winter."

Anyhow, we're thankful none of our area people was hurt or suffered property damage in the storm.

ADVANTAGES OF VILLAGE INCORPORATION

(Third in a series of articles explaining the pros and cons of village incorporation, as advocated by the Weidman Business Association. These articles were researched and written by Attorney Stephen Fox, at the WBA's request.)

1. Incorporation provides the legal authority for exercising local control over such important matters as zoning, building standards, health regulations, and safety of local citizens.

2. It provides the legal authority to engage in all types of necessary local services, such as police protection (including traffic control), fire protection, water and sewer systems, street maintenance (including snow removal), recreation, street lighting, and similar services.

It also provides the legal power to levy taxes sufficient to provide those services which local citizens want and are willing to pay for through taxation.

3. Incorporation permits the adoption of a home rule charter--one that is tailor-made to meet the needs of the community. The Home Rule Act grants more flexibility to home rule villages than is enjoyed by many other local units of government--general law villages, townships, and counties.

Furthermore, every home rule charter is authorized by, drafted by, approved by, and put in operation by local citizens only.

4. Incorporation insures that state-collected, locally-shared taxes, which are distributed to local units based on their population, will be spent within the limits of the vaillage. Such funds today are frequently spent on projects and services in the sparsely populated areas of the township.

5. It provides for property assessment for village tax purposes by an officer responsible only to the people residing within the village, and an equitable distribution of the cost of providing municipal services.

6. It permits the community to install such improvements as hard surfaced streets, sidewalks, sewers and street lights, and defray the expense of such improvements by special assessments on the benefited property.

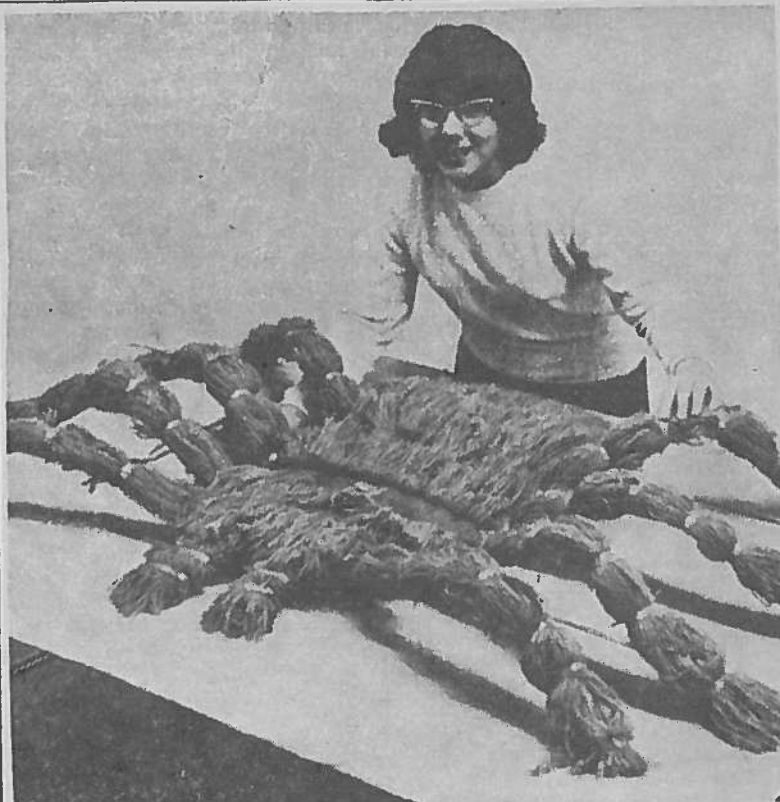
