SPECIAL SCHOOL ELECTION THURSDAY; THIS WEEK

By accident, Ye Ed learned on Monday of this week that there will be a special school election on Thursday of this week, in the course of which the Weidman District will vote on a proposition to levy 9 mills operational tax. The district has been paying seven mills for several years.

Ralph Turnbull, Superintendent of the Weidman School, said in a telephone interview that the public was adequately informed of the coming election. Four printed notices have been posted, he said, at the Weidman Bank, at the school, one at Van Zandt Store on M-20, and one at the Horr Store.

Ye Ed just didn't happen to see the notice posted at the bank; and we have had no occasion, recently, to visit the school, or Eda Van Zandt's store, or the Horr Store, so we were in ignorance till Monday. Tuesday the voters received letters from Ralph Turnbull advising them of the election.

Whichever way the vote goes, it will be a bonanza for the propaganda mills of the proponents of our joining the huge Mecosta district.

If the millage is okayed, you will be paying exorbitant taxes to support a small school already condemned. If the millage is voted down, the effect will be refusal to support our local school. Either way the result will be used as an argument for "reorganizing" into the vast proposed Mecosta-Osceola district.

We have been unable to learn of any immediate plans for a further election on the "reorganization" scheme.

NO DUMP FOR SHERMAN TOWNSHIP: WHAT WILL SHERMAN PEOPLE DO?

Understandably, the Nottawa Township Board has closed the Nottawa Township Dump to all but Nottawa Township residents. Many Sherman Township residents have been using the Nottawa Dump and will now have no place to go.

The Sherman Township Board has been reluctant to consider a township dump for Sherman residents because of the "high cost" of initiating and maintaining it, Supervisor Clyde Beutler said.

A new State law prohibits tires at public dumps, necessitating the bulldozing under of all accumulations, and immediately. Nottawa Township has made its arrangements for this, and will

operate the dump on Fridays and Saturdays only. The public is warned to be careful not to scatter trash; not to deposit papers or other bulky material; and above all, not to deposit dead animals at the public dump.

(This last had become rather a common practice at the Nottawa Dump, it was indicated this week, to the using public's shame. A public dump must be decently used, in our opinion, or it will be placed under stringent stipulations, such as these in the beginning of control by the County Health Department, and more so. The public can blame only itself for strict rules if it abuses the facilities of a public dump.)

Sherman's Supervisor said Monday that Sherman has no plans for a township dump, as money on hand is earmarked for road-building.

On its primary road-building agenda are two more miles west on the Drew Road, to connect with M-66. Also on the agenda are six miles north and south on the old State Road two miles west of Weidman, to connect with Stamon and Lake station, after other miles have been built in other townships.

Supervisor Beutler said that a township dump for Sherman appears too costly to consider "unless the people appeal for one." Involved would be purchase or acquisition of at least five acres, and a \$2,500 bond, cost, \$25. A bulldozer must be engaged.

"This is up to the people of Sherman," Supervisor Beutler said. "It probably would mean either higher taxes, or curtailment of our road-building program.

"Actually, people probably will dig their own holes and bury their own refuse," he said. (Many will simply dump along roadsides, and in wooded areas. This is known to be prevalent in many rural counties.)

A special election would be necessary to decide on a township dump for Sherman, the
