HYMN SING AT WEIDMAN METHODIST CHURCH DRAWS BIG CROWD

More than 150 people gathered in the Weidman Methodist Church at 7:30 Sunday evening, Aug. 21, for a Great Northern Hymn Sing.

The occasion grew out of the fact that so many of the ministers serving Methodist churches in this area have served churches in the Grand Traverse District of the Michigan Conference. This district is the northwestern section of the state.

Having experienced the pleasure and blessings of the Hymn Sings which are held frequently in the Grand Traverse District, several of the ministers who were in positions of leadership in the Junior High Camp at Wesley Woods, near Hastings, got together and decided that we should invite to a Great Northern Hymn Sing the churches whose ministers had had this Northern experience.

Twenty-one churches were invited, and 16 were represented. The plan was informal, with no set and fixed program.

George McClain, Jr., led the group in the singing of several hymns.

Each church was asked to furnish a musical number, so, as it turned out, we enjoyed the hymn, "Wonderful Grace of Jesus," sung by the choir from the Blanchard Circuit, led by the wife of the pastor, Mrs. Eugene Moore; the hymn, "How Great Thou Art," from the New Methodist Hymnal, sung by a male quartette from the Remus Circuit, accompanied by Mrs. Lawrence Lowell, wife of the pastor, on the organ; a devotional meditation and solo by Rev. Marvin Rosa, pastor of the Rosebush Circuit, and another solo by one of his members, Miss Sara Stilgenbauer.

The program closed with a duet by George and Joyce McClain and the benediction by the local pastor, Rev. Williams P. Reynnders.

The Deerfield Center Church was represented by Arthur Homan as Master of Ceremonies and Cecil Robison, who gave the opening prayer, and several of the members.

Music for the hymn sing was played by Mr. Straley on the organ and Mr. Prout on the piano, both from the Leaton Circuit, where Rev. Mrs. Marjorie Matthews is pastor.

After the program, refreshments were served by the host church in the dining room.

Everyone enjoyed the Great Northern Hymn Sing so much it may become a monthly affair, with a different church entertaining each month.

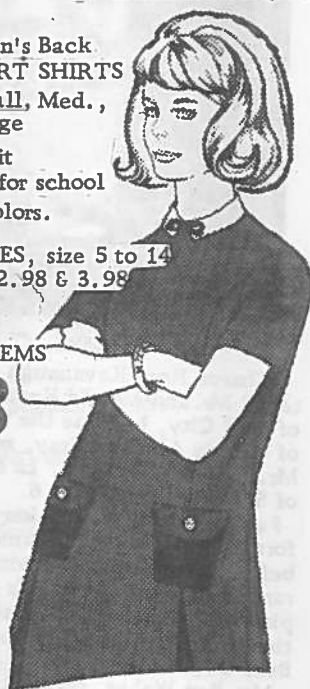
